DISTURBING INFLUENCE

Standard Oil Decision Continues to Trouble Market.

COPPER GROUP AFFECTED

Great Consolidation Project May be Abandoned Pending Final Settlement of Questions Involved in Oil Trust's Appeal to Highest Court.

(By Associated Press.)

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—The decision against the legality of the Standard Oil Company in its present form continued the disturbing influence in the stock market today. It was most acutely manifest in the group of copper industrial.

The reason for this was not that those companies are particularly vulnerable to the effect of the decision in their present form, but that an unanticipated and sharp advance in prices of those stocks have taken place based on the assumption of a coming consolidation of the copper producers on much the same lines as are prohibited by the court's decision in Standard Oil cases.

Today, however, assertion were current that the abandonment of the whole project was being considered pending the final clearing up of the questions involved by the appeal of the Standard Oil case to the highest court.

Eminent corporation lawyers and influential financial leaders seem united in formulating the view that the consequences of the Standard Oil decision would be so dangerous and so harmful that steps will be taken by the law making body to obviate them upon its assembling in December.

Other considerations played little part in the day's market. Wabash preferred stood out as the conspicuous exception to today's market.

No news was forthcoming to explain the strength of Wabash. Bonds were easy. Total sales, par value, \$1,085,000. U. S. bonds were unchanged on call. MAIL BY AUTOMOBILE

F. L. Small Gets Contract For Early Morning Service.

ACROSS LOWER PENINSULA

Trips Will be Made Between Old Point and Newport News, With Stops Each Way in Hampton and Phoebus—Result of Good Work.

According to an announcement from Washington yesterday the postoffice department has decided to resume the early mails between Old Point, Phoebus, Hampton and Newport News, and a contract for carrying the mails by automobile has been awarded Mr. Frank L. Small, of this city.

Mr. Small is authorized to begin the new route on November 29, and he is to make a daily trip during the early hours in the morning from Old Point to Newport News, stopping in Hampton and Phoebus both going and coming.

This means that the morning mails between New York and the northern cities, which was suspended when the Newport News & Old Point Railway & Electric Company gave up the contract last June, is to be resumed and the actions of the postoffice department in establishing the automobile route means much to the business men all over the peninsula.

Postmaster Harry Libby, who has taken a great interest in having the early mails put back on, was informed of the action of the Washington authorities yesterday. Mr. Small is expected to qualify himself for his new duties within the next few days and as soon as the bond is arranged the automobile route will be commenced. The system must be started on November 29.

The Merchants' Association of Hampton, through President Hunter R. Booker, has constantly been in communication with Washington urging the establishment of the route and the assistance given the cause by Postmaster Libby has proven of great value to the men back of the movement.

With the early mails to and from Old Point the business men have a much quicker mail service to the northern cities and the establishment of the route just on the eve of the Christmas holidays is a source of gratification to the business men.

KILLED BY SON-IN-LAW

Owner Ginn Goes on Rampage, Attacking Wife and Shooting His Son.

(By Associated Press.) GOLDSBORO, N. C., Nov. 23.—Inflamed by liquor Owen Ginn, a wealthy farmer of Snow Hill, Wayne county, entered the home of his son-in-law, Samuel Joyner, late last night and opened fire upon Joyner as the latter lay in bed. Escaping the first few shots, Joyner managed to reach his pistol and, returning the fire, killed Ginn instantly with the first bullet.

Earlier in the day Ginn made an attack upon his wife and shot and painfully wounded his young son, who was making a valiant defense of his mother and who finally worsted his father. Ginn had been on a protracted debauch.
