

REQUISITION HONORED

Governor Decides J. L. Bridges Must Stand Trial.

WANTED IN SOUTH CAROLINA

Piano Salesman of This City, Charged With Grand Larceny, Says County Authorities in Two States Are Trying to Blackmail Him.

Governor Swanson announced yesterday that he has honored the requisition papers from the governor of South Carolina for the return of J. L. Bridges, the piano salesman of this city, who was arrested here six weeks ago by Chief Reynolds on a warrant from South Carolina charging him with grand larceny.

Several days later the governor received the papers from South Carolina and held a hearing of the case, Bridges and his attorney appearing before the governor. Mr. Semmes argued against the granting of the requisition, contending that the case was one of alleged blackmail and producing several affidavits from citizens here testifying as to the salesman's good character in this city.

STOLE PLUMP TURKEYS.

John Henry, a Negro, Arrested on Charge of Housebreaking.

With the capture yesterday morning of John Henry, a negro, a stop has been put to the robbing of the turkey coop in the basement of the home of Mr. W. P. Ballard, 2910 West avenue. Two of the nine turkeys which Mr. Ballard placed in his cellar last week disappeared last night. They caught the negro leaving the yard about 6 o'clock yesterday morning and turned him over to Patrolman Price.

Chief Reynolds questioned Henry at the station and found that he had sold the two turkeys stolen Tuesday night to Wolf Levy for \$2 and that he had contracted with a Chinaman to supply him with two turkeys at \$1 each. Henry is a prisoner at the city jail on the charge of housebreaking. He will be given a hearing by Justice Brown this week.

Coal for Tampico. The British steamer Burbo Bank steamed yesterday for Tampico, Mexico, with a cargo of 4,076 tons of coal, valued at \$10,475.

GRAIN FOR LONDON.

British Steamer Powhatan Clears With General Cargo.

Having loaded 68,571 bushels of corn and other exports, the British steamer Powhatan, of the Furness-Withy Line, cleared yesterday for London via Norfolk and will steam today. She will complete her cargo at Norfolk.

After the Powhatan was taken out of the berth on the north side of grain pier No. 5 yesterday morning, the Furness-Withy liner Savannah was docked there and is now loading a consignment of corn for Liverpool. She will steam this week.

One Ship for Fuel.

One steamer, the British South Australia, loaded bunker coal at this port yesterday. The vessel is en route from Charleston, S. C., to Bremen.

STEAMSHIP AGENT COMPLAINS.

James E. Abbe, Jr., Says Ship is Not Loaded Fast Enough at Richmond.

Mr. James E. Abbe, Jr., of this city, Virginia agent for the Donald Steamship Company, has returned from Richmond, where he looked after the loading of the British steamer Querda with a cargo of lumber for Nova Scotia. While in Richmond Mr. Abbe complained to the newspapers and others against the slow loading of the vessel. He claimed that the ship should have completed the cargo on Monday, whereas she will not finish loading before today.

Mr. Abbe says that Richmond lacks proper wharf facilities for the loading of vessels and that the Southern Railway Company, which carried the lumber for Richmond to be loaded on the Querda does not give adequate car service to the docks. He also complains that the foreman of the dock would not furnish the proper number of stavedores to load the ship and refused to allow any additional men to be carried from this city to Richmond to assist in the work.

Arrested for Non-Support.

On a warrant issued by Judge Barham in the Corporation Court, Charles Thomas, a negro, who lives at 619 Twenty-fourth street, was arrested yesterday afternoon by Patrolman Griffin on the charges of non-support. The warrant was issued upon the complaint of the man's wife, who appeared in the court with two little children and told Judge Barham that her husband had deserted her and would not provide for her or the children.

RIGHTS OF STATE COURTS.

Representative Kitchin Introduces Bill in Congress.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 15.—To make it impossible to remove from the courts of a state to those of the United States an action brought by an individual or corporation against a corporation of another state or foreign country, maintaining the office of agents in the state in which the suit was brought was the object of a bill introduced today by Representative Kitchin of North Carolina.

ACCOUNT OF MANAGUA UPRISING CONFIRMED

Vice-Consul Caldera Notifies State Department of Disturbance—Zelayas' Promise.

(By Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 15.—Yesterday's dispatches containing an account of the anti-Zelayan demonstration in Managua, were confirmed by a telegram received at the state department from Vice Consul Caldera. From this dispatch, which was dated yesterday morning, it appears that some of the demonstrators were arrested by government authorities, but who were the people placed under arrest is not indicated.

The dispatch also says that Zelaya has published statements promising to resign the presidency of Nicaragua in favor of Madriz, who as Zelaya's candidate, is not the choice of the people there.

Mr. Caldera, in speaking of the demonstration the night before says that large crowds surrounded the American legation cheering the government and the people of the United States.

FIRES FOUR TIMES AT BLOODFIELD CHIEF

Lewis Watson, Young Negro, Attempts to Kill Officer and Escapes.

When Chief of Police Madison, of Bloodfield, attempted to arrest Lewis Watson, a negro 20 years old, yesterday morning, he was shot at four times by the negro, who succeeded in making his escape after an exciting chase of more than two miles. Chief Madison escaped uninjured, as all four of the bullets from the army rifle with which the negro was armed went wild.

At the time of this shooting, Chief Madison was going to the home of Watson's mother in response to a call for assistance, the woman having telephoned the station house that her son had threatened to kill her with an army rifle. When the chief was standing behind a telegraph pole, opened fire. The chief turned and the negro started to run, the officer giving chase. Soon Watson turned and fired again, but this shot, too, went wild. Within a few minutes, the negro fired two more shots and when he saw that neither of them had taken effect, he threw the rifle across his shoulder and ran rapidly toward East End.

Although carrying the heavy rifle, the negro succeeded in distancing the chief until the latter pressed a passing buggy into service in the chase. However, valuable time was lost by the officer in explaining to the owner of the vehicle why it was wanted and Watson escaped by plunging into a swamp on the Briarfield road, more than two miles from Bloodfield. He has not yet been captured.
