

STOCK MARKET NARROW

Course of Price Movement Takes Another Shift.

OFFERINGS RATHER SMALL

No Striking Features Develop to Explain Action on the Exchange—Congested Condition of New Bond Issues is Cited as Factor.

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, March 30.—The course of the price movement of stocks shifted again today. The amounts offered for sale were not of great volume, but the demand was insufficient to absorb them except at material concessions. The dealing had an appearance of professionalism and the market was obviously narrow and apathetic. There were no striking news developments to explain the actions of the market. A factor in inducing this action was the revised estimates of the extent of the rains in the southwest, news of which prompted the buying of yesterday. The action of the wheat and cotton markets today was calculated to throw doubt on the efficiency of the relief afforded from the drought conditions which are said to be damaging the crop prospects.

Conclusions of wide application were drawn from the sudden weakness shown by the Atchison convertible bonds which were dealt in "when issued" in the outside market. Compared with a price 110 made yesterday after the issue was announced, the price ran off to 103 1/2. It was advanced in explanation that a provision by which the right of conversion is deferred until 1915 first became known today.

The episode was cited, however, to show a congested condition of new bond issues in the market. Special interest attaches to the opinion of Chairman James J. Hill, of the Great Northern, regarded as expert authority, that the railroads of the country will require new capital at the rate of \$1,600,000 a year for six years to come to provide absolute necessities. In the face of this demand for bonds from home and American domestic investment sources continues to fall off. The speculation in rubber shares in that market shows no abatement. The preparations for the April settlements made no impression on the local money market.

The growing demand for money has an ominous influence on sentiment as it is attributed in part, to a falling off from mercantile and manufacturing borrowers. There was much discussion today of the lingering discouragement to enterprise in a prolonged delay in the decision of the important cases before the Supreme Court, the possibility of which is suggested in connection with the death of Justice Brewer. There was a rally in prices when it became known that the Supreme Court would be in session on Monday with the possibility inferred of decisions being handed down.

The bond market was apathetic and irregular. Total sales, par value, \$4,166,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.

Total sales for the day were 688,600 shares, including: Amalgamated Copper, 49,700; Sugar, 1,200; Tobacco, 200; Atlantic Coast Line, 200; Louisville & Nashville, 1,500; Union Pacific, 60,600; United States Steel, 16,900; Virginia Carolina Chemical, 4,400.
