

BASEBALL WORLD

ALTHOUGH the National and American League teams have been out on the long pennant race only nine days they already have a batch of postponed games to play off and this in spite of the fact that the league magnates purposely moved up the opening date in each league a week in order to avoid having so many postponed games on account of cold weather usually prevailing in the West and East during the first half of April. Thus far not a single game has been postponed on account of cold weather, but rain and snow here prevented a total of thirteen games in the National League and ten games in the American League. While no announcement to that effect has yet been made, the teams probably will not begin playing off the postponed games before the latter part of May as they will not hardly settle down on the long stretch before that time.

The World's Champions and the New York Giants already have broken into the "hard luck" column. Each team had a valuable player injured last Friday, Owen Wilson, right gardener for the Pirates and Marquard, pitcher for the Giants, being the victims. Wilson fell while making a sensational catch and was internally injured. There is no telling how long he will be out of the game and, although the Champions have good substitutes in both Hyatt and Vincent Campbell, the loss of Wilson even for a short time will be felt. He is one of the greatest fielding outfielders with the majors and, although he does not rank up among the swatters, he has long been regarded as a reliable and timely swatter. Marquard's loss also will be felt by the Giants for the "Rube" has been going good this season and has given promise of presenting some returns for the \$10,000 Jawn McGraw put up for him. Marquard's injury is not a very serious one and he should be back in form within two weeks or more.

Chicago supporters are gratified by the news that Johnny Kling, the brainiest catcher in the game today, has wired the National Commissioner that he will report to the Chicago Cubs this week for duty behind the

bat. Although reinstated by the National Commission, Kling did not join the Cubs much to the disappointment of the rooters for Frank Chance's band. Last week President Lynch wired Kling that he would either re-appoint to Chicago or be suspended for another year, and Kling said he would report. The return of Kling will strengthen the Cubs just about twenty per cent. He knows how to handle the Chicago pitchers far better than Archer does and with Johnny behind the bat the twirlers will go much better. Besides this Kling puts barrels of pepper into the infield work, is a sure pegger to bases and has a fertile brain out of which come many schemes to ensnare the opposing baserunners.

Now that the major leagues are under way one does not see so many predictions about what teams will come under the wire winners on October 14. While the teams were down South going through their spring training, the newspaper's writers were busy figuring out who would win and at least four "sure winners" were picked for each league. In the National League it is practically certain that Pittsburgh, Chicago, New York, Philadelphia and Cincinnati will be in the fight to the finish with either Pittsburgh or Chicago as the winners at the finish. Detroit, Philadelphia, Cleveland and Boston probably will be the "big four" in the American League with Detroit and Philadelphia again fighting for the pennant at the close.

Philadelphia's pitchers seem to be going far better than those of any other team in the National League and the Phillies are keeping in the fore just now. This team must be counted in the running this season. The Phillies are a fine lot of players, good fielders, base runners and batters, and, while they did not make much of a showing last year, they are working hard for Player-Manager Doolin. It was generally believed last year that the team "lead down" on the old manager and that this was responsible for its final position far down in the heap when the finish line was reached.

Addie Joss, star slabman for the

Cleveland Naps, shut Chicago out last week without a hit—a record which every pitcher strives for and which but few attain. This was the first and only no-hit game of the present season in either league. Joss has been in the no-hit class before, having pitched such a game in the season of 1908. At that time he equalled the world's pitching record, not a single player reaching first base against him.

Three home runs were hit by Boston players in the game between the Boston Red Sox and Washington Friday. On the day previous Eberfeld, for Washington, hit for the circuit with the bases full, making a total of four home runs for the two days.
