Majority Favors Dropping Relief Association. RICHMOND, VA., July 6.—The Firemen's Relief Association will soon be disbanded and the \$20,000 in its treasury divided among the members, if a plan suggested by Attorney S. S. Patterson at a stormy meeting of that body last night.

In order to get around the recent ruling of Judge John H. Ingram to the effect that the association cannot be dissolved except by the unanimous consent of all the members, Attorney Louis P. Wenderberg will go before the State Corporation Commission and have the charter amended. The wording will be changed so as to allow a disbanding at the request of a majority of the members, and the faction headed by Fire Captain John Redwood, which opposes such a course, being hopelessly in the minority, it is probable that before the end of the present year, the association will have ceased to exist.
