Fox Terrier Awakens Physician and Wife as House Burns.

BLAZE STARTS IN CLOSET

Rate Supposed to Have Been Responsible for Fire Which Gutted Two-story Dwelling House, Entailing Loss of More Than \$1,000.

Displaying almost human intelligence, "Nionchick," the pet dog of Dr. H. L. Adler, of 219 Twenty-sixth street, saved the physician, his wife and little girl from a horrible death by suffocation or burning about 5 o'clock yesterday morning.

Realizing their danger, Dr. Adler sprang from the bed and hastily aroused the sleeping child. He then hurried into the hall and found that the back stairs were a mass of flames and that all of the lower floor was ablaze.

Neighbors Send in Alarm. In the meantime, the neighbors had been aroused and cries of "fire" and "help" were soon set up. An alarm was sent in and the Central fire company was on the scene in a few minutes.

Blaze Creates Much Excitement. The blaze created much excitement in the neighborhood and within a few minutes several hundred people gathered on the scene.

SAILOR INJURED IN PECULIAR ACCIDENT

Riveter's Hammer Flies off Handle and Strikes Man in Forehead.

B. Trimuz, a sailor of the crew of the Old Dominion steamer Jamestown, which is undergoing repairs at the shipyard, was seriously, though perhaps not fatally, injured yesterday morning on board his vessel.

The force of the blow felled the sailor to the deck and rendered him unconscious, while the steel hammer cut a gash in his forehead. The workmen hastened to the wounded man and a hurry call was sent in for the shipyard ambulance, in which the man was taken to the St. Francis hospital.

It is believed that the hammer produced a slight fracture of the skull, but Dr. Hobson said yesterday that an operation probably will not be necessary.

TROUBLE MAY RESULT

More Negro Families Moving Across "Dead Line."

WHITE PEOPLE PROTEST

Residents of Virginia Avenue Neighborhood, Who Held Mass Meeting Several Months Ago, Are Now on the Warpath Again.

In spite of the protest registered by the residents of that section at a mass meeting held in the city hall several months ago, more negro families have crossed the "dead line" and moved into houses in the white residential section at Twenty-sixth street and Virginia avenue.

T. A. Fowler, a well known broker, who lives in that section, said yesterday that a negro family has just moved into the house near the corner of Virginia avenue and Twenty-sixth street, which is owned by Moss Sheppard.

Several months ago, J. E. Warren rented the apartments in the brick row on Virginia avenue between Twenty-fifth street and Twenty-sixth street to negroes and the white people living in that section got up in arms and two mass meetings were held.

At that time it developed that several negro families were living in houses along the side streets between Virginia avenue and Huntington avenue and Twenty-eighth street and Thirty-first street.

Another meeting of the white citizens of the invaded section probably will be held in the near future to discuss the matter and try to strike upon some plan to get the negroes out of the white section.

C. & O. CANNOT OWN HOCKING VALLEY STOCK

Decision of Judge Kinkead is Sustained by Action of the Federal Court.

COLUMBUS, OHIO, Aug. 3.—Judge J. E. Sater, of the United States District Court rendered an opinion today in the case of Ralph E. Westfall vs. the Hocking Valley and the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad Companies that entirely sustains Judge E. B. Kinkead in his decision for the same case before it was transferred from his court to the Federal Court.
