And be it further enacted, That all stationery of every name and nature, for the use of the two Houses of Congress, and all stationery and jobbing of every name and nature, for the use of the several departments of government, and for the bureau and offices in those departments at Washington, including all stationery, blanks, wrapping-paper, and twine, and mail-bags, furnished the post offices and collectors' offices throughout the United States, shall hereafter be furnished and performed by contract, by the lowest bidder, as follows: The Secretary of the Senate, the Clerk of the House of Representatives, the head of each Department, and such deputy postmasters in the post office establishment, and such collectors in the custom-house establishment, as the Postmaster General and the Secretary of the Treasury shall respectively designate for that purpose, shall respectively advertise once a week for at least four weeks in one of the newspapers published in the city of Washington, for the places where such articles are to be furnished, and such printing done, for sealed proposals for furnishing such articles, or the whole of any particular class of articles, or for doing such printing, or the whole of any specified job thereof, to be done at such place, specifying in such advertisement the amount, quantity, and description of the class of articles to be furnished, and, as near as may be, the nature, amount, and kind of printing to be done; and all such proposals shall be kept sealed until the day specified in such advertisement for opening the same, when they shall be opened, by or under the direction of the officer named in such advertisement, in the presence of at least two persons; and the person offering to furnish any class of such articles, or to perform any specified portion of job of said work, and giving satisfactory security for the performance thereof, under a forfeiture not exceeding twice the contract price in case of failure, shall receive a contract for doing the same; and the lowest bidder shall fail to enter into such contract and give in such security within a reasonable time, to be fixed in such advertisement, then the contract shall be given to the next lowest bidder, who shall enter into such contract and give such security.
