## PHILADELPHIA RELIEVED.

### The Bennington Arrives.

The white cruiser Philadelphia will leave Honolulu next week and the gunboat Bennington will be stationed here till further orders. She arrived yesterday morning seven and one half days out from San Francisco and anchored in the naval row. The Bennington is commanded by Commander C. W. Thomas, who was here in the Hartford twenty years ago. The following is the full list of her officers:

The Bennington is of the third rate class. Her displacement is 1704 tons, length 230 feet, breadth 36 feet and draught 14 feet. Work was begun on her by W. F. Palmer, Jr., & Co. of Chester, Penn., in 1887, and she was finished in 1890. She is of steel, has two propellers and is schooner rigged. Her horse power is 3436, and her speed 17.50 knots.

## A DESPERATE LEPER.

### He is Arrested by C. A. Brown.

Manuela, a half Portuguese leper who gained some notoriety a few months ago by defying the police officers who were hunting him, was surprised in his house at Waiau last Tuesday by C. A. Brown, and quietly submitted to arrest. 
