COURT RECORD.
Proceedings Before the Circuit Court Special Session.

VARIOUS CULLINGS FROM THE CLERK'S OFFICE.

Judge Cooper on Friday last reinstated on the calendar the assumpsit suit of J. Tinker vs. Wm. Maxwell, and J. F. Scott, Secretary of the Board of Education, garnishee The case was heard without a jury yesterday when Judge Cooper gave judgment for the full amount claimed and costs. The amount of judgment in the District Court appeared from was \$32 63. Plaintiff in person; Poepeo for defendant. Chas. Wilcox was non-suited for failing to appear, when his case against W. C. Achi was called on June 3rd. Yesterday, a motion to reinstate the case was heard on behalf of plaintiff, but it was refused by the Court. Edgings for the motion, Kahookano for defendant

Judgment has been entered for plaintiff in Ignacio de Fraga vs. the Portuguese Mutual Benefit Society of Hawaii for \$417.88 and costs of \$50.45, a total of \$468 33. Defendant by W. S. Edings, attorney, has given notice of appeal and motion for a new trial. In F. Harrison and A. V. Gear, co-partners, vs. J. H. Bruns, the defendant by his attorney, F. M. Hatch, has filed an amended answer, giving notice that among other defenses he relies upon the statute of frauds.

Henry Smith, commissioner to partition lands involved in E. K. Nahaolelua and her husband vs. Kaashu w. and others, has reported that it would be impracticable, under circumstances related by him, to partition the land, and that it would be more feasible and equitable to offer the lands for sale at public auction as one whole.

In the matter of James J. Byrne vs John Martin, receiver, and A. Peek, garnishee, the defendants by their attorney, F. M. Hatch, petition for a commission to take the testimony of John Martin and four others, who reside at Port Angeles, Washington State. The suit has arisen from a contract on the O. R. & L. Co.'s extension of their railway.

Mrs. Annie S. Reist petitions for power to sell real estate for the maintenance of herself and children, she having received an advantageous offer for land at Wailuku from the Wailuku Sugar Company.

Upon the motion to dismiss, made by defendants in Hiwaui vs Lumaheloi and others, Judge Cooper has allowed plaintiff to amend service upon Lumaheloi, with costs upon plaintiff, defendant to have further time to answer. Motion for motion, Kahookano for plaintiff.

Decrees have been filed in accordance with the decision of Judge Whiting in the two insurance cases and libel relating to the steamer Waimanalo. An appeal is taken by the several defendants to the Supreme Court

Wm. R. Castle petitions for the appointment of James B. Castle as temporary administrator of the estate of his late brother H. N. Castle. The estate is valued at about \$23 50, consisting of ninety shares in the Hawaiian Gazette Company's stock, a hundred shares Ewa Plantation, fifty shares Kahuku Plantation and \$10,000 life insurance. The late Mr. Castle was lost in the foundering of the steamship Elbe in the North Sea, together with a child born from a first marriage. His heirs are his widow and his daughter born in December, 1894

George A.
