THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION, BY THE GOVERNOR.

In conference with a Proclamation by the President of the United States...

Col. John Patrick, of Omaha, died on last Saturday morning.

James H. Lucas, the wealthiest citizen of St. Louis, died last Sunday.

Official returns of the Pennsylvania election give Gordon, for Supreme Court Judge, a majority of 14,684, and Mackey for State Treasurer, 29,352.

The Columbus, (Ohio) State Journal says that Democrats are fuller of courage than they were during the Greeley campaign, only it is a little differently qualified.

The case of James Palmer, George M. Waldo and Mrs. Randall, indicted for the murder of George R. Randall in Johnson county, will be taken to Pawnee county, for trial. Judge Mason will defend them.

The late small war in Sonora, Mexico, has been successfully quelled, the rebel chiefs having surrendered to constitutional authority, but affairs in the State are still unsettled and unsatisfactory that further trouble is apprehended.

It is probable that the term of office of McMahon, as President of the French Republic, may be extended for six or ten years, or life. He will also ask for increased powers, and his aim in future will be to further strengthen his government.

The Chicago and Boston fires are quoted among the causes of the financial pinch by the leading business men of the country. It will now be in order for the Democratic whangdoers to show that these fires were caused by the Republican administration.

The election in Chicago hinged on the liquor question—whether saloons should be permitted to keep open after 11 o'clock on week day nights, and through the day on Sundays. Calvin, a Democrat of the Bourbon type, (we know him well,) was elected Mayor, and will recede the restraining measures adopted by Mayor Medill.

Four important personages have died in this country since our last issue, viz: The widow of the late rebel Gen. R. E. Lee; Gen. Hardee, of "Hardee Tactics" fame; Louis Goswold Clarke, the well known and popular editor of the old Knickerbocker Magazine, and Laura Keane, the celebrated actress.

Ex-Gov. James has been indicted by the Lancaster County Grand Jury, for the embezzlement of certain moneys collected by him from the U. S., in payment of certain military claims. We do not think this indictment will stick. The money was forwarded to, and received by James, who, on the advice of friends, deposited it in a certain bank. James' reason for thus depositing the money, instead of putting it in the State Treasury, was that it should be available last January to meet claims against the State of a character unusual, and although unusual, it was not considered by any one that James had evil designs on the money, and it is known that he did not profit by it. In his Valentine Message to the Legislature James acknowledged the receipt of the money. Subsequently, on attempting to draw it, the banker laid claim that the greater portion of it, claiming that the State was indebted to him in an amount equal to that which he withheld from James. We think a suit against said banker would adhere.

CASTING OUT THE LEPPERS.

Success is the popular deity, the inspiration of the little and the great, and the spur to fresh achievements.

These thoughts are impressed upon us by the result of the late elections. Take, for instance, Garfield's district in Ohio, one of the strongest Republican sections in that grand old commonwealth. At the late election the unpopular Allen defeated the popular Noyes in that district. Why? Not because the electors of the district preferred Allen to Noyes, or had become weak in the Republican faith, but because their Representative had exercised the power with which he had been clothed of filching from the National Treasury money to which he had no shadow of title.

Let us look at Wisconsin, one of the staunchest Republican States in the Union. Here we find the Republican candidate for Governor defeated. Why? Not because of his unpopularity, for he was and is very popular. No. It was because during the campaign, Carpenter, the U. S. Senator from that State, whose term was about expiring, audaciously held up his unclean hands for the admiration of constituents he had robbed, and had the insolence to demand enforcement of his perfidious acts.

No, the Republican party will not condone with workers of iniquity, but will purify itself when occasion offers and opportunity presents. The offenders are marked. They form an appendage to the party proper which can be lopped off without injury to the main stem.

We have heard much of the Chicago committee appropriating the bounty of a generous and sympathetic people sent to relieve the suffering of that city after the great fire, but such reports have been looked upon with distrust.
