The Council met, 13th inst., present: John L. Carson, Mayor, J. B. Decker, clerk, and Councilmen W. W. Hackney, Joseph Body, Alex. Robinson, A. H. Gilmore, E. Huddart and Chas. Neidhart.

The Mayor read a message

making certain recommendations, and reciting the new law for government of cities of the second class.

The official bonds of S. A. Osborn,

treasurer, and J. B. Decker, clerk, were presented and approved.

The Mayor appointed the following

standing committees:

On Finance—Hackney, Gilmore,

Body, On Streets—Huddart, Robinson, Neidhart.

Mr. Hackney was elected president

of the council.

The Mayor appointed T. L. Schick,

Esq., city attorney, and W. H. Lo-rain, overseer of streets, with full powers and confidence in the board of County Commissioners of said county, in the matters involved herein, and that they will act in good faith and according to the will of the taxpayers interested therein, defend against the collection of any of the bonds outstanding against said precinct, for the purpose of inducing them to make such defense, we do each, severally, constitute and appoint the said board of Commissioners our agents to contract and employ attorneys to make such defense, and to make all necessary contracts incidental to the employment of attorneys the making of such defense—and we do each, severally, further promise to, and agree with, the attorneys so employed, to pay them on such employment and what shall become due them thereunder such a proportion of the whole of such attorneys fees and the costs and expense of such defense as the assessed value of our taxable property bears to the aggregate assessed value of the taxable property of all the signers hereof, within the said territory. The assessments for the year 1879 shall be taken as the basis of such apportionment. Provided, that the obligation of this contract shall not exceed four per cent of the said respective amounts of the said assessments for 1879.

On motion the subscription papers

were placed in the hands of the board of managers, and they impowered to sell the same to circulate said papers.

On motion meeting adjourned

subject to the call of the chairman.
