

MRS. KATIE WILKINS BURNED TO DEATH.

Explosion of a Lamp Which She Was Carrying Threw Oil Over Her Dress.

HUSBAND LABORED IN VAIN.

He Almost Sacrificed His Life in Trying to Save Her—Her Father Also is Nearly Prostrated.

The explosion of a small lamp in the hands of Mrs. Katie Wilkins at her home on Dillon street last night caused her death and resulted in serious injuries to her husband, John Wilkins, who witnessed the fatal death, and nearly sacrificed his own life in the frantic endeavor to save her.

The couple, who were married less than a year ago, lived in a three-story house at No. 1475 Dillon street, owned by the woman's father, Michael Klasek, No. 1211 Dillon street. Last night after supper they sat for an hour or more in the front room of their apartments. About a clock they prepared to retire, and the wife started to the bedroom carrying a lamp with a fancy shade, which had been given her for a Christmas present. Just as she stepped into the bedroom the lamp exploded, throwing burning oil over Mrs. Wilkins and the furniture in the room, and setting the woman's light dress on fire.

With a shriek, the woman started for the rear door. Her husband, though stunned by the explosion, realized what had happened, and rushed to her aid. He tried to smother the flames, but the fire was too strong, and he was unable to do so. The woman, with superhuman strength given her by suffering, broke away from her husband, and, apparently unconscious, fell into the street. Her husband, who was nearly prostrated by the explosion, followed her, and in a few moments he had almost unrecognizable. He fell in a helpless heap upon the sidewalk, and his wife fell dead in the street.

The police made by the explosion and the screams of the woman attracted a number of bystanders. Several men from a nearby saloon rushed to the scene. Three of them broke open the door of the house, and the sister of the woman and some other women entered. They found Mrs. Wilkins lying on the floor, and her husband lying on the sidewalk. The police arrived and took the woman to the hospital, but she died before she could be revived. Her husband was taken to the hospital, but he is still in a critical condition. Her father, Michael Klasek, father of the dead woman, is nearly prostrated with grief, and could hardly be talked with at all.
