SEWAGE POLLUTION APPEARS AT PEORIA.

Sightseers Crowded the Bridge Expecting to See Dead Animals and Debris.

CHEMIST GARNER'S NORMAL. Peoria's Typhoid Fever Rate Dropped Twenty Per Cent When She Drank From Wells Instead of From the River.

BY A STAFF CORRESPONDENT. Peoria, Ill., Jan. 25.—Chicago washes her hands of all sewage pollution in the river below this city 10 miles distant from her.
