

PRESIDENT BRINGS PRESSURE TO BEAR.

Summons Senators to White House to Urge Hay-Pauncefote Treaty.

SAYS MEASURE MUST PASS.

Only Alternative is the Retirement of the Secretary of State From the Cabinet—Hard Fight On.

Washington, March 6.—For some days the President has been urging Senator Payne, chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations, to report the Hay-Pauncefote treaty to the Senate.

This hour the President's information of several days ago that the ratification of the treaty involved the administration's honor, and for that reason must be put through.

The only alternative is the retirement of the Secretary of State from the Cabinet—Hard Fight On.

Accordingly a meeting was held today by members of the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations, and the President's desire for prompt and decisive action.

Mr. Morgan submitted his report on the Hay-Pauncefote treaty and its relation to the isthmian canal. This report was in a measure a review of all the treaties to which this Government has been party.

No effort will be made by the full committee to report the treaty. Chairman Davis kept the President on the subject, and he has warned the President of the danger that would confront an immediate report.

The State Department's policy of terrorism of the two Central American Republics, Costa Rica and Nicaragua, is a view to forcing them to give up the Hay-Pauncefote treaty.

All efforts to secure from either the State or Navy Department the withdrawal of the orders given to Commanders Kennedy of the Detroit and Colby of the Marlborough are unavailing.

Both the Nicaragua and Costa Rican legations today faintly stated that they were unwary of any trouble in prospect, that the two Governments were incapable of dealing with it.

On Monday morning when, in these dispatches, we announced the fact that Nicaragua and Costa Rica were opposed to the Hay-Pauncefote treaty.


The Nicaraguan Minister, Senor Correa, was unjustly suspected of having furnished some of the information upon which the Republic story was based.
