What harvest began in the Perry section of Oklahoma. The prospects are for a great crop.





New York, June 1.-Traveling incognito and attended only by a lady in waiting, Princess Arlbert of Anhalt, eldest daughter of the Princess Christian and grand daughter of Queen Victoria, arrived in New York on the Atlantic Wednesday evening.

It is the first visit the Princess has made to America, and her coming has been warmly welcomed by her personal friends of heretofore and her mother, Princess Christian, who before her marriage to Prince Christian of Saxe-Coburg, was Princess Helena Augusta, second daughter of the Queen.

Princess Arlbert is here as a tourist, solely for pleasure, and has preferred to remain incognito, but she leaves New York Sunday for Washington, where she is to be received at the Arlington Hotel, her identity can scarcely be kept a secret hereafter.

After a brief visit to the national capital the Princess expects to return to New York Wednesday of Thursday. She will remain here three or four days, after which she will visit Canada. Her present intention is to return home some time in July.
