

LEADER OF ANARCHISTS TO BE THE RULERS OF EUROPE.

Twenty-Seven Leaders Said to Have Sailed From This Country.

LED BY COUNT MALATESTA.

Far-Reaching Conspiracy Was Hatched at Paterson, N. J.

ORDERED KING'S DEATH.

Bresci Left Wife and Child to Obey Dictates of the Organization.

New York, Aug. 2.—Twenty-seven Anarchists, dominated by a leader known as Count Nicola Malatesta, sailed from this port within the last few weeks, pledged, the secret service agents say, to destroy the rulers of the world.

A plan so far-reaching as this is said to have evolved in Paterson, N. J., where Count Nicola Malatesta has until recently made his home and directed the followers of a cult founded on social disorder.

Count Malatesta, under the name in every country of Europe save England, is now in London. He was in Paris. It was to the French capital, it is asserted, that twenty-seven men, it was there that they received their orders to go forth and slay.

From the Old World comes the news which said that the plans of the twenty and seven are progressing. The King of Italy was slain at Monza, and Bresci, the Italian silk weaver who was the assassin of King Humbert, is now in London. He has been warned to beware of him by one who wrote from Italy, "Bresci, under torture, said to-day in Italy, 'The czar will be next.'"

It is known that four persons sailed from this city only a few weeks ago, whose names are closely associated with the anarchist movement of Italy's monarch. One of these was Gaetano Bresci, who left his wife and child to perform a duty which he considered that he was a weak man, and he was urged on by a woman, "La Belle Teresa."

Only short time ago, he left this country, the Count was a guest of honor at a dinner given at Bozka's. The proprietor of the place was once a silk weaver and he had been in the habit of making silk weavers to the house of one who was once their fellow craftsman.

QUINTAVALLI'S WIFE ALSO AN ANARCHIST.

New York, Aug. 2.—Anarchy that brought death to King Humbert also carried desolation to another American wife, Nicola Quintavalli, companion of Bresci when he sailed to kill the King of Italy, and now, arrested, charged with complicity in the assassination, left behind a spouse 28 years old.

Mrs. Quintavalli had no knowledge that her husband was an Anarchist until she read that he had been arrested. She refused to believe at first that the news was true, but became convinced by inquiry on Wednesday, and since then has been overcome with grief.

She could not sleep on Wednesday night, but cried continually, and this morning, after attempting to work, became ill and left the cigar factory. She told her fellow-employees that she had no knowledge that her husband had been friendly with the Anarchists. He had gone abroad, she declared, to see his mother in Italy.

Mrs. Auld, her sister, who lives on the top floor of one of a row of tenement houses, said to-day that the couple have been married for two years. They have no children. The sister said she did not know where they met or much about the husband, except that he came from Italy. The wife is one of a family of five girls, two of whom live in this city. They are of Italian parentage, but were born in this country.

"My sister and her husband came to live with us last April," said Mrs. Auld. "They moved from West Hoboken, when he became ill. He did not work much, but my sister got work in the cigar factory and went out early mornings and came in late in the day."
