PRINCIPAL CROPS DECLINED IN JULY.

Department of Agriculture Issues Its Regular Monthly Crop Report.

CORN CONDITION IS POORER. Wheat Improved Half a Point, but Is 27.2 Points Lower Than Last Year—Statement of Other Crops.

Washington, Aug. 10.—The August report of the statistician of the Department of Agriculture shows the following averages of condition upon August 1:

Corn, 52.3 spring wheat, 68.4; oats, 85; barley, 71.6; spring rye, 76; buckwheat, 87.3; potatoes, 83.2; timothy, 70.9.

The average condition of corn declined 2 points during July and on August 1 it was 54 points lower than at the corresponding date last year, but 3.5 of a point higher than on August 1, 1899, and 13.3 points above the mean of the August averages for the last ten years.

Wheat Improved Half a Point, but Is 27.2 Points Lower Than Last Year—Statement of Other Crops.

Wheat, 70.9. The average condition of wheat improved 1/2 point during July, but on August 1 it was 27.2 points lower than at the corresponding date last year, 40.1 points lower than on August 1, 1899, and 12.1 points below the mean of the August averages for the last ten years.

Barley Declined 4.7 Points. The average condition of barley declined 4.7 points during July, and on August 1 it was 47.2 points lower than at the corresponding date last year, 12.1 points below the mean of the August averages for the last ten years.
