WARRANTING TO ENGLISHMEN.

America is Taking Away the Steel Manufacturing Business.

SPECIAL BY CABLE.

London, Aug. 11.—(Copyright, 1900, by W. R. Hearst.)—The London Times gives prominence to a warning written by one of England's leading manufacturers about the danger of losing the steel business to America. "As an English iron and steel manufacturer, acquainted with most of the leading steel works in America, in Great Britain and on the Continent, I hope that all English steelmakers will appreciate the effort that they must make and the large sums of money that they must spend to bring the steel works of our country in line with the best American ones."

"Failing this, we shall be obliged to import our steel from America and Canada, where, with great natural advantages and great ingenuity, they have designed plants which are able to produce unlimited quantities of steel at very low cost."

"The Dominion Iron and Steel Company of Sydney, Nova Scotia, inspired by the genius and energy of the American capital, will shortly begin operations on a big scale in extensive works situated where coal and iron stone can be as cheaply as anywhere in the world and manufactured into steel."

"In addition to this the Canadian Government will give a bounty for all iron and steel manufactured in the Dominion. This means that when the works are fairly established the Dominion company will be able to distribute steel from Liverpool or any English port to the American coast, where they are situated on the spot, the bounty serving to bridge the Atlantic."

"The Lake Superior mines are nearly a thousand miles from the coast, and the distance of water carriage over the lakes than from Bilbao to Cardiff, the route by which much of the iron ore reaches England. Yet for us to convey the ore to the coal centers a less distance than the American ore is carried by rail, to say nothing of the water freight, costs considerably more. It is a plain case for the Pittsburgh manufacturers for the whole thousand miles. The question of the economical production of steel in this country is the most vital importance in view of the American competition."

SHAH LEAVES PARIS.

Persian Ruler Will Pass a Few Days at Ostend.

Paris, Aug. 11.—The official visit of the Shah of Persia to Paris ended this morning. Accompanied by President Loubet and M. Delcasse, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, his majesty rode to the railway station surrounded by an escort of cavalry and started for Ostend.

The Shah arrived at Ostend at 5 o'clock to-night. He was received by the military authorities, his arrival being without incident.

FAMILY IS ALARMED.

Pistol Shot Fired at Vandalia, Ill., Party as They Sat on the Lawn.

Vandalia, Ill., Aug. 11.—A sensation was created last night when it became known in the neighborhood that a shot had been fired at a party consisting of Mrs. Nellie Brown, wife of John J. Brown, Miss Lucille, their daughter, and Mr. Fred Roder, a friend of the family, who were sitting out on the lawn at Mr. Brown's residence.

The shot came from directly across the street and the leaden missile whizzed uncomfortably close to their ears. Mrs. Brown was looking south across the street and saw the flash at the moment the weapon discharged.

Mrs. Brown says she is confident that the body who fired the shot was secreted behind a tree with low hanging foliage which stands directly across from Mr. Brown's residence in a vacant lot.

DRINK HABIT AMONG WOMEN. DESPERATE EFFORT TO ENJOY WIVERS.

Physicians Declare That It Has No Geographical or Social Limitations.

Mrs. Mary L. Lake of this city, vice president of the Catholic Total Abstinence Union of America, in a speech delivered in the annual convention at Philadelphia last Thursday, made some plain, blunt statements regarding the prevalence of intoxication among the women of the country. Mrs. Lake said that drunkenness among women is on the increase, and especially noticeable among women in society, whose lapses from the right path is more noticed and commented upon than in the humbler walks of life.

Mr. Lake's startling arraignment of her sex, which is said to have shocked her listeners and the staid public of Philadelphia, is not a matter of surprise to those who have had an opportunity to observe closely the conditions prevailing in "society." Mrs. Lake, in her address to the convention, included in her arraignment only those women who have the entire unbridled society, and who are charitable enough to regard the evil of intoxication was brought about, primarily, by the social exigencies of the season, which overtaxed the physical endurance of women and compelled them to seek some stimulant to their natural recuperative powers.

The announcement that many women, in the semiprivate of afternoon teas, receptions and other public functions, are intoxicated by people of their own social standing, are as inveterate tipplers as the men, is not regarded as startling news by St. Louis physicians and others who have made a study of the subject. These men declare that it is a lamentable condition that has only been limited at in the society circles, lightly touched upon in the conservative circles of the city, and, at times, happens, one of their number falls into the hands of the police.

Intoxication among women has no geographical or social limitations, say specialists. It is as much in evidence in London, Vienna, Paris and Berlin as it is in New York, Chicago, St. Louis or San Francisco. The high-born aristocratic matron or debutante drinks high-priced wines and selective cordons at the exclusive functions of their set, while the saleswoman or stenographer imbibes in any quantity in the parks or summer gardens. The only difference is that the former is compelled in semiprivate, while the latter is compelled to take her in the full glare of publicity.

Physicians who make a specialty of treating nervous diseases, under which definition the drink habit is classed, declare that fondness for liquor has taken a strong hold of women.

Equally distressing to a physician whose patronage is derived mainly from the wealthier class does not number among his patients one or more women who are undergoing treatment for the cure of alcoholism. Several of these physicians maintain private sanitariums where their patients can be treated with the strictest privacy while undergoing the cure. The institutions of greater pretensions maintain separate divisions for women patients, who undergo the same treatment as the men.

At all times of the prevalence of drunkenness and tipping among women in society, a well-informed St. Louis man, who is looked upon as an authority in this subject, said:

"There is more drunkenness among women than the average public has any conception of, especially among the upper classes. The reason for this is not far to seek. There is not an opportunity, but every inducement, offered society women, especially the younger and unmarried ones, to indulge in intoxicants. Nowadays no social function, no matter how simple, is thought of unless some one is circulating beverage is offered the guests. No reception is complete without its punch bowl champagne, its wine, its bouquet of dinner has its various wines, claret, sauterne, burgundy, champagne, ending with brandy. Cocktail parties are given in formal luncheons, and heavy wines at dances. Debutantes, buds of two or three months, are given a course of champagne, port wine, and other stimulants. The liquid refreshments are stimulating, refreshing and exhilarating, and a delightful time is had. Next morning the effect has worn off, the woman finds herself depressed, and, by ill, she needs a stimulant—what the men call a 'bracer.' Feeling this need, she calls on her physician or druggist, who too often prescribes morphine to relieve the depression and revive her spirits. That is the beginning of the end. The woman, having her appetite for drink destroyed, acquires the drink habit and the drug habit at one and the same time, almost."

At the very next social function, remembering the exhilaration that followed her previous dalliance with the fascinating liquor, she induces again the same condition, or if she pays any heed to the future, with the complete thought that the trifling indisposition which may follow overindulgence.

In the homes of the city there is either a wine cabinet, or a sideboard, to which the women of the household have access. A woman who has once tasted the sweets of the grape juice and its kindred, and has learned through more experience the harm for overindulgence, the temptation to indulge secretly, where the opportunity is so convenient, is a woman who has been other households where neither a cellar nor a sideboard is maintained, the head of which pays his monthly bills in a lump without inquiring into the items. This gives the woman or women the opportunity to obtain liquor in any quantity desired, and have it charged without the knowledge of the head of the household.

It has been a witness on numerous occasions, of orgies indulged in by young girls at formal receptions given by the men at the homes of the city, which could not be surpassed in brazenness. "As Mrs. Lake truly says, there is only one remedy for the evil—the absolute prohibition of the manufacture of liquor. When once the liquor habit has fastened itself upon a woman there is little hope of her redemption. A woman in liquor is the most pitiable spectacle on earth. There seems to be no depth of abasement to which she will not descend."
