CROKER ATTACKS TRUSTS.

Predicts That New York and Indiana Will Go Democratic.

REPUBLICAN SPECIAL.

New York, Aug. 28.—Richard Croker in an interview today repeated the attack on the trusts, which he made in his speech before the Executive Committee of Tammany Hall last week and amplified it considerably, using as an illustration the results of the recent election in the city of New York. He said that there is a great deal of talk about trusts, but that they will not be broken down, and he drew a gloomy picture of the conditions that would follow such a course.

"Where is this trust business going to end?" Mr. Croker asked. "Can you imagine a fairer method of doing business in this city, for instance, than the one that is now in vogue? It is not at all unlikely that within this week the city will be run by a trust among themselves. There is a good deal of talk to that effect, and then what will happen? Why? It would affect your own business, the newspapers more than anything else.

"I have seen these trusts spend \$300,000 a year advertising in the newspapers. That is a big sum, and yet if they consider they will not get the credit they want they will stop it. They could do this if they were not afraid of the public. Mr. Croker declared that if he would carry the State of Indiana by at least 100,000 votes.

"How about New York State, Mr. Croker?"

"I am a Democrat in New York State," he said. "I look for a big sweep here in his favor." "Trusts and imperialism are practically the same," he said.

"It is interesting power in a few or even one man, and it is not born to you. To make this country prosper we have to get back to the old-fashioned American business methods. There were plenty of stores, plenty of employers and plenty of competition. If you don't, it will result in a few men owning the country. I wish to see the situation now in employment, and it is not right. It is not right to have a few men who controlled the most votes, the employer or the employed."
