YOUTSEY MAKES A STRONG DEFENSE.

His Witnesses Flatly Contradict Those of the Commonwealth—Is Still in a Stupor.

Georgetown, Ky., Oct. 17.—The defense in the Youitsey trial closed its case late this afternoon, and the Commonwealth began its rebuttal testimony, which will likely be concluded to-morrow at noon. The feature of the day was the testimony of Colonel Nelson, one of Youitsey's attorneys, who denied that he had told Arthur Goebel and Colonel Campbell that "Youitsey knew enough to hang Governor Taylor," but admitted that he did say his client (Youitsey) knew "something that would be beneficial to the Commonwealth in its prosecution of Taylor."

GERMANY DEMANDED A REAL CHANCELLOR.

Resignation of the Aged and Impotent Prince von Hohenlohe Was Forced.

Kaiser MISUSED HIS POWER.

Violated Constitution in Sending Imperial Troops to China—Ridicule Effective Where Protests Failed.

Berlin, Oct. 17.—(Copyright, 1900, by W. R. Hearst.)—Prince von Hohenlohe-Schillingsfurst has resigned the chancellorship of the Empire. The reasons he assigns for it are his extreme age—he is 82—and the state of his health; but there are other reasons of a much graver nature. Foreign Minister von Bulow was in conference with the Emperor this evening. He is said to have recommended as Hohenlohe's successor Count Philipp zu Eulenberg and Prince von Hohenlohe-Langenburg, and the Emperor will probably choose between them. The chief reason for this change is the demand by the country that the Chancellor be replaced by a man who will do the work of the place. Prince von Hohenlohe has, by reason of age and infirmity, done nothing for many months, and the Emperor's hands have been free. The consequence is that many things have been done which have roused the indignation of Germany. The Kaiser's policy of vengeance in the East would have received loyal support, but the method of executing it was palpably unconstitutional. He had no power under the Constitution to send any but Prussian troops to China, yet he has sent those of the Imperial army. This has caused more than murmuring.

Trouble May Be Adjusted.

Dallas, Tex., Oct. 17.—Attorney General Smith, who to-day conferred with the managers of the Farmers' and Merchants' Mutual Fire Association, charged with violation of the State anti-trust law, stated tonight that matters were in a fair way for adjustment, and that if certain conditions were complied with the company will be permitted to continue doing business in Texas. The Attorney General also consulted with City Attorney Henry on the status of the alleged electric light and power trust in Dallas.

Well-Known Surgeon Dead.

Burlington, Ia., Oct. 17.—Dr. George Nelson Jones died to-day at the Mercy Hospital, aged 48. He was one of the best-known surgeons in Iowa.

Dean of Harvard is Dead.

Cambridge, Mass., Oct. 17.—Charles E. Everett, professor and dean of the Harvard Divinity School, died at his home here to-day. He was 71 years of age.

OLD MAN'S CHILDREN SAY HE IS INSANE.

Hans Lawther's Wife Accused of Impairing Estate.

CASE IS IN COURT.

Children of Hans Lawther of Fulton, Mo., who filed a petition this week asking that he be declared of unsound mind, allege that the second wife, whom he married at the age of 55 years, in the course of all the troubles which have beset the family in the last three years.

The Court is asked to appoint a guardian for the old man to take charge of his affairs. The petitioners state that he is under the complete control of his wife, and that on this account the old man's estate, which was estimated at \$200,000, has become impaired, and is likely to be dissipated entirely.

Doctor Charles H. Hughes of St. Louis and Doctor J. G. Kierman of Chicago will testify at the hearing of the petition next Monday as to the mental condition of the aged Mr. Lawther. The plaintiffs will try to prove that the defendant was of sound mind when the suit was first instituted, and some sensational testimony is expected.

Hans Lawther is one of the best-known men in Callaway County and maintains his residence in Fulton, the capital of the county. He came to Fulton in 1824, direct from Ireland, and started to work for a Mrs. M. T. Dyer, who kept a general store at that place. Subsequently he married a daughter of his employer, Miss Verdelia Dyer. For years he was considered the head of the man in the county. His complexion was such that he became generally known as the man who had "the peach blossom on his cheek."

NEW YORK FIRE'S FEARFUL WORK.

Eight Persons Burned to Death in a Crazy, Three-Story Frame Tenement-House.

New York, Oct. 17.—Eight persons were either burned to death or suffocated in a fire which partially destroyed the three-story and attic frame double tenement-house, Nos. 45 and 46 1/2 Hester street, early to-day. The dead:

Sarah Sasa, 35 years old; Samuel Sasa, 33; Lena Sasa, 3; Morris Sasa, 2; Mrs. Horowitz, 46; Rosa Lewis, 52; Mabel Strauss, 6; Samuel Strauss, 2; Mary Murray, aged 40, was severely burned about the back and was taken to a hospital. On the third floor of No. 45 lived Charles Sasa, his wife and four children, his mother-in-law, and a Mrs. Horowitz. Sasa took the child and ran and rushed to the fire escape. He managed to get down to the balcony in front of the building on the second floor, and supposed that his wife and the others were following him. Mrs. Horowitz was the only one who followed him, however. She took the child from his arms when she saw their escape cut off, and cried to a policeman below to catch her. The policeman held out his arms and, as the child fell, he caught it safely and shouted to her to drop. Sasa had already hung down and dropped to the ground. Mrs. Horowitz was about to drop when flames suddenly burst through an opening on the first floor with such fury that she was driven back against the wall and her only escape was cut off.

On the balcony, only a few feet above the ground, but hedged in on all sides by flames, she was burned to death before the eyes of the terrified crowd gathered in the street. Mrs. Sasa, with little Morris, had been unable to get further than the window, and they were both overcome by smoke and perished. Lena Sasa ran into the hallway and was caught by the flames. Her husband, who was tried to rescue Mrs. Rosa Lewis from the flames, but was unsuccessful, and they perished together. Their bodies were found in the hallway, the lady's arms still clasped about the aged woman's waist, as though she had died while trying to drag her out.

RESCUED FOR THIRD TIME.

Susie McCabe Again Tries the Morphine Route out of Trouble.

Susie McCabe, 27 years old, a servant at No. 128 Washington street, who had been rescued last week, tried to commit suicide for the third time yesterday. She swallowed 10 cents' worth of morphine and was sent to the City Hospital about 4 o'clock unresponsive. The stomach pump was applied by Doctor Prouty, and he is of the opinion of the physicians that she is not in a serious condition.

YOUNG FILIPINO IS ANXIOUS TO VOTE.

Supervisor of Registration, However, Is Undecided as to His Right to Do So.

REPUBLIC SPECIAL. Omaha, Neb., Oct. 17.—It is a native of the Philippines, and as such entitled to register preparatory to voting for President? This is the proposition seriously disturbing the Supervisor of Registration here.

Hamon Reyes, a 21-year-old Filipino, presented himself for registration, insisting that he is a citizen of the United States and entitled to all the privileges of Americans who were born under the Stars and Stripes. He has been in the United States for about eighteen months, and had been in Omaha for more than a year. All of this time has been spent in one voting precinct. At one time Reyes applied to the Clerk of the District Court for naturalization papers, but the Clerk informed him that he did not think it possible to issue such papers, because the Philippines are subjects of the United States.

There is no government in the Philippines excepting that established by the United States, and the man has no government to which he can swear allegiance. Reyes is an ethical and moral man of age. He came to Omaha, in the island of Samar, about 30 miles south of Manila. He is the son of a wealthy Filipino family and is in the United States for the purpose of studying English and American customs. He came to San Francisco in the transport, Memphis, and started on a tour of the United States. Finding that he could learn the language better by remaining in one place, Reyes stopped in Omaha and accepted a position in a Leavenworth street drug store.

He attends night school and has acquired a good command of English. His right to register has not yet been determined.

ITS SALE MUST CEASE.

Legislation Will Be Enacted Forbidding Sale of Cocaine.

Nashville, Tenn., Oct. 17.—To-night the State Pharmacy Board met and instructed its attorney to file a bill to be presented to the next Legislature providing for the regulation of the sale of cocaine in Tennessee. The use of this drug among the lower classes, especially the negroes, has increased with alarming rapidity in the last few months at an alarming rate, and all efforts of the municipal authorities to prevent the sale of the drug have failed.

The shooting occurred in Pazen's office in the presence of several persons. Miss Carl claims that Pazen bumped her head against a door, and she was angry. She then drew a revolver and shot him in the stomach. She then pulled a revolver and shot him.

Leo C. Teller, manager of Seaman's Music Hall, came to Miss Carl's assistance after hearing the details of the shooting. "The girl has been deeply wronged by these men," said Teller. "I will do everything I can to help her, and I will see her through the trouble. I employed her several weeks ago, and because of what I was told by these people I discharged her. I can see now that I did her an injustice, and in reparation for that I will give her all the old pay I could."

Miss Carl's home is at Anconia, Fla. Her husband is Watson Campbell, a leading man in the "Moon Hollow" company. She is 25 years old, a tall blonde and very pretty. She says she does not regret her action, as she was only defending her honor.

Died From His Wound.
