

RAILROAD NEWS FROM ALL POINTS.

Important Extensions and Absorption of Other Lines Contemplated by the Rock Island.

TO BUILD INTO EL PASO.

Rumors Concerning Harriman, Pacific Mail and the Through Route From New York to Asia—Increases Shown by Wabash.

Chicago, Oct. 22.—The Tribune says: "It is stated by a prominent official of the Rock Island road that it is the intention of the company to extend its southern division and absorb a line that will give it its own track into El Paso, Tex., where connection is made with the Mexican Central and Southern Pacific railroads.

"Work is to begin shortly on an extension of the Rock Island's Liberal branch, which will run from that place through the Texas Panhandle and Northeast New Mexico to White Oaks, N. M.

"At this point it will connect with the El Paso and Northern Pacific Railroad, extending to El Paso.

"The latter road is to be acquired by the Rock Island, either by lease or purchase of the stocks and bonds, thus securing a continuous line from Chicago via either Omaha or Kansas City to El Paso.

"At this point it will connect with the Mexican Central for the City of Mexico, and with the Southern Pacific for Southern California.

PRACTICAL CONSOLIDATION.

Reported Plans Concerning the C. & A. and K. C. Southern.

Chicago, Oct. 22.—H. Harriman is here for the purpose of practically consolidating the Chicago and Alton road and the Kansas City Southern, formerly known as the Kansas City, Chicago and Gulf. It is reported that Mr. Harriman and his friends have obtained control of the latter road, which was controlled by John W. Gates and his friends.

It is said that Mr. Harriman has decided that the independent organizations of the Alton and the Kansas City Southern must be maintained for an indefinite period, but that practical consolidation can now be effected by having the two roads under the fixed charges of the Kansas City Southern and the Chicago and Alton.

Mr. Harriman declined to be interviewed as to the ultimate amalgamation of the Alton and Kansas City Southern, but in the report that a syndicate, headed by himself, had obtained control of the Pacific Mail.

STATEMENT BY C. H. TWEED.

New York, Oct. 21.—Charles H. Tweed, one of the directors of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, said today concerning the change in control of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company.

"I know nothing about the alleged deal, and the intention of the Pacific Mail certainly could not change hands without my knowledge. The executors of the Harrington estate have had no contact with me since the death of my father-in-law, and I do not see, therefore, how this story can be confirmed.

ACTION TAKEN BY RAILROADS.

Will Refuse to Certain Cotton Bills of Lading After November 1.

George H. Morgan, secretary of the Merchants' Exchange, has posted the following letter, sent him by the St. Louis Eastbound Freight Committee under date of October 20.

"You are hereby notified that on account of legal complications involving the St. Louis Eastbound Freight Committee, the roads named below will not accept bills of lading on cotton notes or receipts covering cotton stored in warehouses or compresses in St. Louis or in the State of Missouri.

New York, Oct. 21.—The report that President E. T. Jeffrey of the center and Rio Grande is to retire is emphatically denied by chairman George Coppel of the Board of Directors.

VAILLE HAS RESIGNED.

Cotterman Succeeds Him as Director General in Philippines.

Washington, Oct. 21.—C. M. Cotterman, assistant superintendent of the railway mail service, with headquarters at San Francisco, has been selected as director general of postal service in the Philippines, to succeed F. W. Vaille, resigned.

The policy of the department is to permit the incumbent of the office to be relieved after two years' service, on account of the difficult nature of the work. Accordingly Mr. Vaille recently submitted his resignation and urged immediate relief. While not strictly ill, he has been indisposed for some time.

Mr. Cotterman has conditionally accepted the office. He has had long experience in the service, and is familiar with the work in Alaska and the North Pacific Coast. His salary as director general of the Philippines is \$4,000 a year.

Mr. Vaille has made a good record in the Philippines. His annual report, just received, shows a balance of \$1,000 for the last fiscal year. Instead of a deficit, and the service has been extended and considerably improved. He will continue to act as assistant superintendent, his resignation to be hereafter determined. He is expected to leave in January.

ROBERTS DENIES CARNEGIE IS TO BUILD HIS RAILROADS.

London, Oct. 21.—Lord Roberts has sent the following dispatch to the War Office: "I have just received your telegram of October 21st referring to my alleged intention of building a railway in America. I placed by Colonel Grouard in America. I believe in Mr. Carnegie's plan, but I do not intend to do it. I am, however, in communication with the Hon. Secretary of the War Office, and I shall be glad to see the Hon. Secretary's views on the subject."
