STAND UP FOR MISSOURI.

To the Editor of The Republic. St. Louis, Nov. 1.—The Honorable James S. Rollins died January 8, 1888.

SENATE BILL 35, 1883, APPROVED MARCH 21, PP. 180, 181, WAS AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE PERMANENT INVESTMENT OF ANY MONIES REMAINING IN THE STATE TREASURY BELONGING TO EITHER THE PUBLIC SCHOOL FUND OR SENIARY FUND OF THE STATE, OR THAT MIGHT THEREAFTER BE PAID INTO THE STATE TREASURY, TO BE ADDED TO EITHER OF SAID FUNDS, AND TO PROVIDE FOR CANCELING ANY MISSOURI STATE BONDS THEN HELD BY ANY EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION UNDER THE CONTROL OF THE STATE, BY ISSUING THEREOF CERTIFICATES OF INDEBTEDNESS OF THE STATE BEARING 5 PER CENT INTEREST PER ANNUM, PAYABLE SEMIANNUALLY.

SECTION 7 OF SAID ACT READS: "THE STATE OF MISSOURI IS HEREBY CONSTITUTED CUSTODIAN AND IS MADE TRUSTEE OF ALL MONIES WHICH MAY BE PAID INTO THE STATE TREASURY UNDER THIS ACT, AND OF THE CERTIFICATES OF INDEBTEDNESS WHICH MAY BE ISSUED UNDER THE SAME, AND THE HONOR AND GOOD FAITH OF THE STATE IS HEREBY PLEDGED FOR THE FAITHFUL PERFORMANCE OF THE TRUST HEREIN CREATED."
