
SAYS FILIPINOS WILL FIGHT ON.

WHAT THE NAVY COSTS.

Report of Paymaster Kenny Deals in Large Figures.

REPUBLIC SPECIAL. Washington, Nov. 9.—The annual report of Paymaster General Kenny of the navy deals in large figures. He shows that last year he spent \$10,560,000 on account of construction and purchase of ships, \$3,320,000 for repairs to ships, \$11,700,000 to keep ships in commission, including pay, \$1,300,000 for the Marine Corps and \$93,883 for the Naval Academy.

Mr. New has declined office so far, and an effort will be made to get him to accept the Cabinet appointment, which, it is felt here in Indiana, he is entitled to.
