AMERICA HAS YIELDED TO DESIRES OF THE POWERS.

Congress Instructed to Concur in Most Important Demands.

ANXIOUS FOR EARLY PEACE.

United States Will Do Nothing to Delay the Negotiations.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—In order to hasten the settlement of the negotiations in progress in Peking this Government has yielded to the desires of the majority of the Powers on several important points. Minister Coger has called, at frequent intervals recently, relative to the propositions submitted to him by his colleagues. He has been acquainted with the views of this Government thereon, but at the same time has been told that much is left to his discretion, and that the President is especially anxious for speedy settlement.

PEKIN RECORDS SHOW CHINESE SAW AMERICA BEFORE COLUMBUS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—The archives of Peking have given up a secret that may lead to the solution of a mystery that has baffled every student of American archeology since the Western Hemisphere was first visited by Columbus.

There have been found in the ancient Eastern capital records which prove conclusively that a landing was made on this continent by the Mongolians in the year 98 A. D., centuries before the Genoese Admiral was born and before the acceptance of the theory that the Chinese first discovered the wise men of Europe to seek a new world in the West.

Students of early American history have found unmistakable evidence of Asiatic civilization among the forgotten ruins of the continent. They have traced the traces through the wonderful works left by the Aztecs and the Incas to the predecessors of the race, the Toltecs.

They have found what they believed to be proof that this Asiatic influence came to America from the north successively through what is now California and Lower California, but beyond this there has been nothing but the vaguest speculation.

The discoveries made by American soldiers in Peking show a direct line of communication from the records made by the Chinese in the year 98 A. D. to the records of the discovery of America by Columbus.

KAISER REVIEWS CHINESE TROUBLES.

German Reichstag Is Opened With the Customary Speech From the Throne.

LARGE CREDITS ASKED FOR.

Explanation Made of the Neglect to Obtain Parliament's Sanction for the Chinese Expedition.

Berlin, Nov. 14.—The Reichstag reassembled today. The speech from the throne dwelt at considerable length on the events in China, which have excited such deep emotion among civilized people.

"Fanatical hate and dark superstition, incited by unscrupulous advisers of the court, have driven misguided masses of Chinese to acts of atrocious violence against the Western civilization and Christian worship dwelling peacefully in their midst."

"My Minister died at the hand of an assassin in a courageous attempt to overcome the rising peril. The foreigners at the capital saw themselves threatened with death and limb. These things of horror united the civilized community, where otherwise there was a divergence. All nations against which the unparalleled onslaught was directed drew closer. Their sons fought with a manly shoulder to shoulder, even as younger soldiers float side by side. So the Governments show the sole wish to restore an orderly state of things as speedily as possible, and after the punishment of the chief culprits, avert a recurrence in the future of such a disturbance of the peace of the world."

In announcing that the relations of Germany with all the powers are good, the speech recalls His Majesty's sorrow at the assassination of King Humbert of Italy, which he was "my dear friend and dear friend, who fell a victim to a damnable outrage."

The speech then proceeded: "I would sooner have consulted the Reichstag on the measures on China, but for the necessity of prompt action and the difficulty of furnishing reliable information. Whenever the Reichstag could form definite opinions or estimate the extent of the Government felt confident that the representatives would not refuse their assent to sanction to the necessary expenditure."

Turning to domestic matters, His Majesty said that in consequence of the natural growth of the revenue and the increased taxation voted last session, more abundant funds were available in almost every branch of life in the Empire, especially for measures for the benefit of workers, and for the defense of the country. His Majesty added, would probably be laid before the Reichstag during the present session.

The speech concluded by announcing various bills which would be introduced. Deadwood, S. D., Nov. 14.—The worst storm of the winter began this morning with a gentle snow and mist. Reports from surrounding towns and mining camps state that the storm is general. Telephone messages from Belle Fourche state that on the plains north and west the wind is blowing hard, and the snow is blinding. The thermometer has fallen thirty degrees since morning, and it is growing colder tonight. The storm is heaviest in the mountains west of this city, where the snow is already two feet deep. Almost all trains, except Deadwood and Deadwood to Rapid City, and the Rapid City and Deadwood, are suspended tonight. As yet the storm has not interfered with railroad traffic.
