DAISY PEASE WAS DETERMINED TO DIE.

Evidence at Inquest Showed She Resisted Attempts to Prevent Her Taking Drug.

Doctor Frank Boogher, Deputy Coroner, held an inquest yesterday on the body of Daisy Pease, who died at the City Hospital Tuesday morning from the effects of a dose of morphine taken the night before in Lafayette Park. A verdict of suicide was rendered.

Only two witnesses were examined—Mrs. Ella Wilcox, a sister of the dead girl, living at No. 3233 Caroline street, and Louis Campbell, who was with Daisy Pease when she took the poison. Daisy lived at No. 1820 Chouteau avenue, where she was employed by Johannes Schumacher, who conducts an art studio. On Monday, according to the testimony of her sister, Daisy's father came from his home in Rockwood, Ill., to persuade Daisy to return home with him. Mr. Pease had heard through some friend that she had been to a party at the home of Mrs. Campbell, and he was very dejected. Louis Campbell, a friend, tried to comfort her, but she refused to be comforted, declaring she was going to end her life.

Campbell accompanied her to Lafayette Park, where he said she drew a bottle from her bosom and attempted to drink its contents. He tried to strike it from her hand, but she said she would rather die than be taken away and drunk it. Before he could do anything with her, a doctor who was called said she had taken no poison, and she was allowed to return home. On the following day she was discovered in an unconscious condition and hurried to the City Hospital, where she died four hours afterwards.

Mrs. Wilcox, while on a visit to her parents in Rockwood, last summer informed them that she had seen a bottle of morphine and this caused her father to visit St. Louis. In a letter left by the suicide she blames her father for her death.

NEW NORTH-POLE PROJECT.
 Canadian Explorer Gains Sir Clements Markham's Support.

Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 28.—A special to the News from Montreal, Quebec, says that "Captain Bernier of Quebec has gained the support of Sir Clements Markham, the former explorer of the Northwest Passage, for his scheme to reach the North Pole, and is now in this city making arrangements. Captain Bernier's plans contemplate the departure of an expedition from Vancouver with a wooden or steel ship and a crew of sailors and five scientists. Entering the polar basin in August, a month earlier than Nansen did, the ship would begin to drift 200 miles further east than Nansen's vessel did. The expedition would winter in the ice."

BOY CONVICTED OF MURDER.

Novak will be confined in the House of Reformatory under the Indeterminate act, where he will be confined until he reaches the age of 21.

JUDGE CRITICISED OFFICIALS' ACTION.

Eleven Cases Against South St. Louis Citizens Dismissed in First District Court.

CITY ASKED FOR CONTINUANCE.
 Zimmermann Said That Defendants Were Practically Compelled to Violate Ordinances by Lack of Sewers.

Judge Zimmermann of the First District Police Court yesterday dismissed charges against eleven citizens of South St. Louis who were accused of allowing waste water to run into the streets where no sewers have been provided.

At the same time he forcibly expressed his disapproval of ordinances, which, he said, practically forces citizens to become lawbreakers. The persons who were accused of violating the ordinances were: Frank Seelme, No. 3739 Kosciusko street; Edward Seelme, No. 3729 Kosciusko street; Henrietta Wehmiller, No. 2861 Kosciusko street; Conrad Lich, No. 3761 Kosciusko street; Philip Mullmann, No. 2865 Kosciusko street; Louise Tietze, No. 3769 Marine avenue; Barthold H. Vennentz, No. 2899 Marine avenue; Wilhelm Peters, No. 3811 Kosciusko street; John F. Dueringer, No. 2854 Marine avenue; George W. Leming, No. 3838 Marine avenue; John William Betzold, No. 3828 Kosciusko street.

The cases have been pending for more than a month. Yesterday was fixed as the date for trial, and all the defendants were on hand. But Attorney T. M. Zimmermann was to represent the Health Department, failed to show up. Instead, he sent a postal card in asking for a continuance until December 19, at the request of Chief Sanitary Officer Francis, but giving no reason for postponement was desired. Judge Zimmermann said:

"This court is not run for the convenience of city officials, but for the convenience of the defendants to further inconvenience, and the charges are dismissed."

"Under one ordinance the defendants are forbidden to discharge waste water into the streets, and in another they were required to connect their premises with a sewer. These streets there are no sewers, although they have been asked for many times. If people down this way make it a point to keep their premises clean, they have not yet learned how to burn up water for the purpose of scrubbing, dishwashing and other purposes. If the city insists on their using sewers, why doesn't it furnish them?"

Chief Sanitary Officer Francis did not know that the cases had been dismissed until informed by the Republic reporter. He said:

"I asked that the hearing be continued at the request of the Health Department, but that the defendants were good citizens. He thought he might be able to get the Street Department to furnish them with sewers, so as to remedy the trouble."

Mr. Kratz does not do this in the near future, and a means is agreed upon that there are no sewers, but that does not excuse the continuing of waste water into the thoroughfares.

grants experts; that, having thus done the emigrants this serious injury by neglect, the Cherokee Nation then allowed five years to pass without any effort to collect the money; that there remained no other course for the emigrants but to organize and attend to their own business; that now that the emigrants have done an immense amount of labor in their own defense, shown in five large public documents submitted to the Council that the emigrants would not submit to any interference by the Council or allow the Cherokee authorities to represent them in any manner, more especially as the Cherokee authorities were in bad repute in Washington on account of the Cherokee Freedman fraud of \$25,000 and the recent \$10,000 warrant fraud; that for this latter reason the emigrants prefer to represent themselves and avoid the odium attaching to the discredited Cherokee authorities; that the emigrants will demand for redress before the Interior Department, Congress and the courts against any interference whatever.
