has another grievance against the Seckner Contracting Company for failure to start the arc lamps in the downtown district at the stipulated hour. On Sunday Monday and Tuesday nights, Mr. O'Reilly states, some of the circuits were not in operation until nearly 8 o'clock, aithough the contract specifies that all lamps at this time of the year should be turned on at 6:57. The lamps were lighted at the scheduled time, he asserted, but many of them did not burn long, and several hours clapsed before the trouble was remedied. Mr. O'Reilly has complained to the Seckner officers in regard to the matter, only to be informed that the trouble was due to oil in the company's new boilers. When this difficulty was over-come, it was asserted, everything would run smoothly. Some time ago, when the Super-vivor complained about inefficient service, he was informed by the Seckner people that he would have no cause for fault-finding after the company had installed its new boilers. Now, the new boilers have been secured, but, according to Mr. O'Reilly, there is still room for complaint as regards the service. Mr. O'Reilly says he will deduct from the Seckner company's voucher for November the value of the light not furnished, but he will not bring the matter before the Board of Public Improvements, for the reason that that bedy refused to take any action on the charges he recently made against the company."
