WHY GERMANY DID NOT INTERVENE FOR BOERS.

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TRANSPORT ARRIVES

Loaded with Dead.

Bodies of Fifteen Hundred Sailors and Soldiers Brought From the Far East.

San Francisco, Cal., Dec. 10.—The transport Hancock arrived to-day from Manila, via Nagasaki, with a gruesome cargo. It consisted of the bodies of about 1,500 sailors and soldiers who either died in battle or succumbed to the ravages of disease in the Philippines, China, Guam and Honolulu.

AGAINST PROPOSED INCREASE.

Public School Patrons Think Present Tax Sufficient.

The Board of Control of the St. Louis Public School Patrons' Alliance held its regular monthly meeting last night at the headquarters in the Regille building, between fourth and fifth streets, before presiding officer, P. H. Walker of the Regille School Association, at the meeting, the chief feature of which was the adoption of resolutions concerning the proposed increase of the school tax from 5 to 6 cents.

BLAMES THE COMPANY.

San Antonio City Council Considers the Telephone Strike.

San Antonio, Tex., Dec. 10.—The city Council today took a decisive step toward settling the telephone strike. A resolution was unanimously adopted deprecating the fact that the telephone company had refused to arbitrate its differences with its employees and that it had refused to recognize and deal fairly with accredited representatives of its employees.

HELD FOR THE GRAND JURY.

Broker Lawrence, His Manager and Clerk, Were Examined.

New York, Dec. 10.—Chester B. Lawrence, broker; Edward Underhill, his office manager, and George H. Wilbert, his clerk and assignee, who were arrested November 23 charged with conspiracy and larceny, were re-arrested in Police Court today. The complaint, Mrs. Catherine Rookendorff, alleges that she deposited a \$100 bond with Lawrence and received neither bond nor her bond back.

CHAFFEE'S COURSE MEETS APPROVAL.

In Protesting to Von Waldersee, He Was Merely Carrying Out Instructions.

Washington, Dec. 10.—Major General Chaffee's action in excluding looters from the district in Peking under American control and in protesting against the removal of astronomical instruments from the Peking Observatory by the French and German troops is in harmony with his instructions. It has the unqualified approval of the authorities and no consideration will be given to any complaint that may be made in consequence of the "tone" of General Chaffee's communication to Count von Waldersee.

TONES OF NOTE SATISFACTORY.

Washington Officials Will Give No Consideration to Any Complaints That May Come to Them.

Washington, Dec. 10.—The tone of the communication of General Chaffee's note, said a high official to-day, "is entirely satisfactory to the President. We know nothing about the manner of presentation, but doubt not that it was done courteously."

ARE OPPOSED TO SHIP SUBSIDY BILL.

New York Merchants Pass Condemnatory Resolutions to Be Sent to Congress.

New York, Dec. 10.—The Merchants' Association of New York today adopted resolutions disapproving of the ship subsidy bill before Congress, and determined to begin an aggressive campaign to defeat it.
