CHEMISTS MEET AT CHICAGO. Discuss Oleomargarine and Arseni-

cal Poisoning in Beer.

Chicago, Dec. 27.—The possibility of arsenical poisoning in beer was the topic of popular interest at the opening session of the convention of the American Chemical Society to-day. Several other chemists spoke on the question, urging that all beer and other liquors brewed should be thoroughly analyzed to protect the consumers from dangers of poison.


