CHAFFEE IS JUMPED OVER MANY HEADS.

Advanced Over Generals Wade, Merriam and MacArthur and Fifty-Three Colonels.

WOOD IS MADE A BRIGADIER.

He Will Probably Be at the Head of the Army for Twelve Years—Miles Named for Lieutenant General.

Washington, Feb. 5.—The President today gave the following army nominations to the Senate:

To be Lieutenant General: Major General Nelson A. Miles.

To be Major General: Brigadier General Samuel B. Young, U. S. A.; Colonel Adna R. Chaffee, Eighth Cavalry, U. S. A.

To be Brigadier General: John C. Bates, Second Infantry, U. S. A. (Major General U. S. V.); Major Wheaton, Seventh Infantry, U. S. A. (Major General U. S. V.); George W. Davis, Twenty-third Infantry (Brigadier General U. S. V.); Theodore Schwan, Assistant Adjutant General U. S. A. (Brigadier General U. S. V.); Samuel S. Sumner, Sixth Cavalry, U. S. A.; Leonard Wood, Assistant Surgeon U. S. A. (Major General U. S. V.); Robert H. Hall, Fourth Infantry, U. S. A. (Brigadier General U. S. V.); Robert F. Hughes, Inspector General U. S. A. (Brigadier General U. S. V.); Major William A. Kobbé, Third Artillery, U. S. A. (Brigadier General U. S. V.); Brigadier General Frederick D. Grant, U. S. A. (Brigadier General U. S. V.); Captain J. Franklin Bell, Seventh Cavalry, U. S. A. (Brigadier General U. S. V.).

Chaffee's Big Jump.

Generals Young and MacArthur are jumped over Brigadier Generals Wade and Merriam, and General Chaffee also is advanced over Colonel MacArthur and Ludlow.

The action in the case of General Chaffee is accepted in military circles as an indication that he is to be placed in supreme command of the military forces in the Philippines and that General Young and Bates are to be relieved shortly and assigned to duty in the United States.

The law provides for six Major Generals and the promotion of General Miles to the grade of Major General, which is generally understood, will be filled by the appointment of Brigadier General J. P. Wade, the senior officer of his grade.

There is still one vacancy in the list of Brigadier Generals, and another will be made by the retirement of General Schwab, who is expected to retire in the near future.

Unusual Action in Miles's Case.

During the session of the Cabinet today the nomination of General Miles to the grade of Major General was discussed at length.

An unusual and notable course was pursued by the President with respect to the nomination of Major General Nelson A. Miles to be lieutenant general.

Patent Commissioner's Report.

Washington, Feb. 5.—The report of the Patent Commissioner for 1900 shows that during the year there were received 39,673 applications for patents, 2,255 applications for trademarks, 1,111 applications for designs, 2,099 applications for registration of trade-marks, 56 applications for registration of labels and 31 prints.

General Wood's Brilliant Prospects.

Attention was called at the War Department to the fact that the order of seniority of the general officers appointed today is determined by the dates in February stated in the nomination.

But it is pointed out at the department that the order of seniority of General Wood's nomination in this order will be in the event that he follows the regular order of promotion hereafter, to make him Lieutenant General of the United States Army for fourteen years.

General Wood now stands No. 60 in the list of army captains. Captain J. Franklin Bell, who is No. 55 in the list of captains, will be promoted to the grade of Major General.
