

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS TO HAVE CIVIL GOVERNMENT JULY 1?

Senator Lodge Declares the War Is Over—Administration Decides to Reduce the Army to 40,000 Men.

Boston, April 18.—Senator Henry C. Lodge, chairman of the Philippine Committee of the United States Senate, said in an interview that the Philippines were to be turned over to the civil government July 1. "The Philippines are ready for civil control, and the war is about ended," he said, tersely.

Establishments, all of the regular establishments, shall be brought home when the movement of the volunteers shall have ceased. Third—That regiments, recruiting at home stations, shall be held at the various posts in this country until the movement of regiments from Manila to the archipelago shall have been reduced to 40,000.

TRAIN KILLS FOUR PERSONS WHILE RUNNING BEHIND TIME.

One Terrible Accident Follows Another Till Passengers on New York and Boston Limited Almost Collapse With Nervousness—Passenger's Story of Death-Dealing "Run."

New York, April 18.—When the New York and Boston limited came in from the West Wednesday evening over the New York Central road, the flyer had left in her wake a trail of casualties stretching from Lake Erie to the Hudson River. She reached New York an hour and a half late, but very serious. Incidentally, she had blotted out four human lives in three separate accidents. That was the cause of the broken schedule.

Ogleby went into the Chief's office and said he could tell who murdered the old man. He named Lewis Woodrow, who he said shot Pemberton, stating that Woodrow could be found on the new on the street. The authorities, however, were notified and Woodrow, who is also a negro, was arrested. Ogleby was arrested and both men were taken to Weatherford Thursday morning.

CHARGED WITH FORGERY. Illinois Farmer Held by the Authorities at Pana.

Pana, Ill., April 18.—Henry Volmer, a leading farmer of Oconee, a village six miles south, was arrested here Thursday night. Volmer is charged, came to this city and presented a check to a local bank signed by E. P. Allen, a real estate man of Oconee. When the note was presented, Allen's signature was denied its authenticity. Volmer was taken back to Oconee.

CLAIMS \$2,000 FOR TWENTY WEEKS. Waiter Says His Tips Would Have Amounted to That Sum in Time He Was Unable to Work.

New York, April 18.—Through a suit for damages which Edward Lederer, waiter, has brought against Louis Sherry, the earnings of waiters in first-class restaurants of this city are revealed. Mr. Lederer will claim that his average earnings as a waiter are \$100 a week, and on this basis will demand \$2,000 for the twenty weeks he was forced to lie idle because of an injury sustained while working at Sherry's restaurant.
