TO FORM CAVALRY TROOP FOR FAIR

Fifty Young St. Louisians Chosen for Service by the Light Cavalry Association.

TO ORGANIZE TWO COMPANIES.

Movement Inaugurated at a Meeting at Mercantile Club—Plans for the Equipment of the Soldiers.

The election of fifty young men, who will later be formed into a cavalry organization, and offered to the city for service in the time of the World's Fair, was the outcome of a meeting of the St. Louis Light Cavalry Association, held Saturday evening in the Mercantile Club.

Two companies will be organized under the State militia law and, if possible, will be handsomely mounted and provided with gorgeous uniforms. The first company will be the Lancer Troop and will be known as St. Louis Light Cavalry Company. Their mounts will be enrolled, and mounted on horses. The strength of the two companies will be about 100.

The formation of these companies grew out of a session of the association last December by the St. Louis Light Cavalry association, an aggregation of the veterans of the National Guard of Missouri, which was organized for service in St. Louis after the famous strike of 1877. This Light Guard, and flourished in many prominent events in the course of its active existence. Each member of the guard owned his own mount, and it was their maneuvering always was an exhibition of the finest horsemanship in St. Louis.
