# MEMORABLE FOURTH OF JULY PLANNED FOR ST. LOUIS.

Arrangements for Auspicious Opening of the Day, Parade and Pleas- ing Close—Contract for Pyrotechnic Display—John H. Hundley Appointed Grand Marshal—Captain Robert E. Lee Chief of Staff.

Preparations are under way for a memorable Fourth of July celebration. The association having the celebration in charge is rapidly perfecting its plans, and is daily receiving liberal contributions. Contract has been placed for the fireworks, which will be furnished by the Consolidated Fireworks Company of America, of which John Wankelmann is manager.

The pyrotechnic programme includes thirty displays, consisting of emblematic pieces, illuminations, flying displays, discharges, meteoric showers, rockets, exhibition pieces, with a morning salute of 125 bombs and a grand finale and a grand finale and a grand finale.

He is a direct descendant of "Light Horse Harry" Lee, and of the Lee family, of which General Fitzhugh Lee belongs.

## FEARS AN ATTACK OF RABIES.

Farmer Gebhart's Arm Was Cut by Cow's Teeth.

George Gebhart, a farmer, living at Oakville, St. Louis county, will depart early this week for Chicago for treatment at the Pasteur Institute to prevent an attack of hydrophobia.

A few days ago Gebhart started to milk his cow, when he noticed a large swelling in her throat. He thought that she had attempted to swallow an ear of corn and that it had become lodged in her throat. He put his hand into her mouth to dislodge the object, and in doing so scraped his flesh against the cow's teeth. The blood flowed so freely from the wound that he became alarmed and sent for Doctor S. J. Will of Mohrville. By the time the latter arrived, Gebhart was in convulsions, and he died shortly afterwards. Doctor Will declared that the animal had an attack of hydrophobia.

An examination of the cow's leg showed that she had been bitten by a dog. It is supposed that the dog had rabies, and that the cow contracted it from him.

Doctor Will cauterized Gebhart's wounds and recommended that he go to the Chicago institution as a precaution. Gebhart is about 25 years old.

## FAMOUS BULL CASE UP AGAIN.

The famous Adair County bull case, that has been in the courts for the last thirteen years, was up for trial again yesterday in the Clayton Circuit Court. At the close of the trial Judge McElhinney announced that he would take the matter under advisement and render a decision later.

The title of the case, which has bobbed up every year since 1882, is Thomas E. Sublette vs. the St. Louis, Iron Mountain and Southern Railway Company. The Wabash and the St. Louis and Pacific Railway Company was also made a defendant, as the Iron Mountain was at the time the bull in question was owned by Mr. Sublette, and it was run over and injured so badly

## HAS PRESIDENT KRUGER OFFERED TO RESIGN?

London Discusses Rumor That He Makes New Proposition for Boer Independence.

London, June 15.—There is a plentiful crop of rumors this morning arising from Mrs. Botha's visit to Mr. Kruger.

One positive declaration comes from Brussels that the latter agrees to relinquish his title of President and promises to remain an exile, on the understanding that the independence of the Boers shall be restored under a Botha Government, with safeguards against any future war and guarantees as to the gold mines.

Concerning this, it is enough to say that independence, in the ordinary use of the word, the present British Ministry will never grant to the Boers. So emphatic are the English imperialists, Tory and Liberal, on this point, that the ministry simply dare not, even if they would; but if by independence the Boers mean what Sir Wilfrid Laurier meant when he called Canada a na-

## STRICKEN IN FIANCEE'S HOME.

Edwin C. Osborne Dies From a Stroke of Apoplexy.

Princeton, N. J., June 15.—Edwin C. Osborne, treasurer of Princeton University, died of apoplexy at 5:20 o'clock this morning. Mr. Osborne, accompanied by a friend, called last evening on Mrs. Stelger of Nassau, whom Mr. Osborne was to marry on Monday next. When the two men were leaving the house, at about 11 o'clock, Mr. Osborne staggered, and, grasping the arm of his friend, cried out: "I'm fainting."

Mr. Osborne was assisted to the house and a physician was called, but all efforts to save him proved unavailing, and he died without regaining consciousness.

Mr. Osborne was born in Rahway, N. J., on March 19, 1828. He was made assistant treasurer of the university in 1882 and treasurer in 1885. He is survived by a daughter.

## ACCIDENT WILL DELAY TRIP.

Representatives Were to Have Gone to Philippines on the Legals.

Washington, June 15.—The transport Ingalls, which was wrecked in the Brooklyn dry dock Friday, was the boat on which Representatives DeArmond of Missouri, Smith of Illinois, Burleson of Texas and others were to make a voyage to the Philippines.

The accident will delay the trip, but the War Department officials say that the Ingalls will be in readiness to sail about August 1. The time first set for departure was July 15.
