BRITISH SUFFER DEFEAT.

Boers Make a Successful Attack Upon Bremersdorp Garrison. London, July 27.—Telegraphing from Pretoria, under date of July 26, Lord Kitchener reports to the War Office as follows: "A detachment of the Steinkopje Horse, occupying Bremersdorp, was forced to evacuate July 24 by a superior force of Boers. Probably the commandos from Amsterdam and Pieterb. The detachment fought its way to Lombodo, a distance of sixteen miles, losing about ten killed or wounded and a few missing."
