

TWO GREAT FINISHES AT DELMAR PARK.

Jockey Tommy O'Brien Took the Honors in Both With Ben Hempstead and Swordsman.

Jockey's Poor Horsemanship.

Mr. Rogers' Own Boy Got Fugurtha and Fitzkanet Beaten, Where They Should Have Won—Len Frost Easily.

Two tremendous finishes, four horses noses apart, brought even the most blasé of regular racegoers to their feet at Delmar Park yesterday, and to Jockey O'Brien went all the honors in both.

The first was somewhat ragged, but none the less exciting finish in the third race, where Ben Hempstead, John Storm, Fugurtha and Bart Howe finished hats apart under Judge Brady. The next was in the sixth race, where Swordsman, Barrica and Orris made as close a finish as it is possible for horses to make.

Fugurtha about won the third race, four and one-half furlongs, by a sixteenth of a mile. She owed her defeat to the fearfully bad ride Danngan—who came here well introduced from the East—gave her. Danngan is Mr. Rogers' own boy. How the clever Philadelphia managed to pick up such a really incompetent ride is not easy to see. Fugurtha was about thirty pounds the best horse in the race. As good as 2 and 2 1/2 to 1 was laid about her, where she looked like a 3-to-4 shot.

Thus the bookmakers figured Danngan a 5-to-1 shot. They made him a short price at that. Mr. Dale was exceptionally careful to get Fugurtha started. Danngan had been complaining of harsh treatment from the starter. Fugurtha was off second, right alongside of Barrica, with whom Dugan led the field to the stretch. These two had the inside and half of the track to themselves. Dugan, who was outside and went away like a whirlwind. Danngan and forty feet behind. Dugan's right eye was secured and pulled Fugurtha up. If it was not a start, the rest of the lot broke in the outside. Danngan was a good rider of them was Ben Hempstead, who won O'Brien got him out well and sent him a safe. Danngan's handling of Fugurtha at the start was ridiculous. He was the best rider and best horse under him, had a world of room to get through, yet he pulled up in a craven manner. Fugurtha lost the outside would swing in and jam him. After the race Mr. Rogers said he was about weary of Danngan and would ride some other boy in the future.

There was a will to win, but he was out of a crack of whip and Swordsman had won a nose in front of Barrica, who was a similar effort to Danngan's.

Orris was ten pounds the best and should have won easily. O'Neill handled Orris cleverly at the start and got into second place. Fugurtha looked like a rail rider, but he is getting very much of Danngan's late.

There is not much to the other events. Lynch, a good thing, primed by the good boy, got away well and won the first race easily. George Lewis' Colby was probably best. She was away badly and ran a good race. Lynch acted like a real good colt. Grand-Grand, fit as a fiddle, won the second race. Public said she would run with the Republic. Prior, a general good thing, took the third event. Fitzkanet had the benefit of Danngan's error.

Ben Frost was in good fettle in the fifth and walked home with a good win. He gave him an easy race to the stretch, that his legs did not burn, and then came on sweetly on the outside.
