


EAST ST. LOUIS ENJOYS A BUILDING BOOM.



East St. Louis is experiencing the biggest building boom since its incorporation as a city. There are now being erected in the city, in residences, varying in cost from a humble three-room cottage, at \$60, to a palatial mansion costing \$25,000.

Then there are several business houses which will soon be finished. The principal one is the Hall block, which will be a four-story hotel and store building, at the corner of Collinsville and Missouri avenues. About \$150,000 is invested.

The Wiles Baking Company's new plant, at Eighteenth street and St. Louis avenue, now almost completed, will be the largest bread bakery in the State, exclusive of Chicago. It will have a capacity of 50,000 loaves of bread every twenty-four hours.

The Central Brewery is at present the most expensive building in course of erection. Only the foundation has been laid. The building will cost, when completed, more than \$1,000,000. A definite estimate could not be ascertained.

Buildings at the Stock Yards. The National Stock Yards Company has just completed a series of box houses which has cost in the neighborhood of \$100,000. Contracts have been let for a new barn, which will be erected at the corner of Pennsylvania



avenue and First street in the city of East St. Louis.

Nelson Morris & Co. propose to erect a refrigerating plant at Missouri avenue and the Louisville and Nashville Railroad tracks and have also in view the erection of a yard refinery at the Stock Yards.

Swift & Co. are making plans for the erection of car works which will be located on the west side of the packing-house on the Plank road, and which is expected to cost about \$300,000.

At this point cars will be made for the East St. Louis and Kansas City roads. It will be a branch of the Chicago car works.

Two new freight houses are being built for the Mobile and Ohio Railroad at a cost of \$100,000.

SURGEONS STITCH WINDPIPE OF PATIENT AT HOSPITAL.

Michael Conway, Dangerously Stabbed, is in Fair Way to Recovery, Says Doctor Nietert.

Doctor H. L. Nietert, Superintendent of the City Hospital, stitched together the trachea (windpipe) of Michael Conway, 30 years old, who lives at No. 444 Easton avenue, yesterday morning at the hospital.

Conway still lives, though, beside the wound in the throat, he sustained five other stabs in the upper part of the body. Two of the latter penetrated his left lung, and either is dangerous. Doctor Nietert, however, thinks that Conway's chances for recovery are good.

Conway was cut at 1:30 a. m. yesterday in a fight that grew out of a craps game. With three other men he was gambling at Newstead and Evans avenues. The argument arose over 10 cents. One of the men attacked Conway with a knife, and six times wounded him. The police subsequently arrested Joseph O'Keefe of No. 495 Lucky street, charging them with having participated in the game.

Speaking of Conway's chances of recovery, Doctor Nietert said that he did not think that death would ensue from the wound in the throat, but that the other injuries sustained were serious. It is pronounced that Conway has had but one other case since he has had charge of the hospital.


