RAILROAD NEWS FROM ALL POINTS.

Ten Per Cent Stock Dividend Declared by the Choctaw, Oklahoma and Gulf.

RESOLUTIONS WERE ADOPTED.

Common and Preferred Stock Now on Same Basis—Presidents' Conference—Burlington Denial—Notes.

PHILADELPHIA SPECIAL.

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 7.—The declaration of 10 per cent stock dividend on Choctaw, Oklahoma and Gulf Railway common shares, in addition to a semiannual dividend of 5 per cent, led to some questioning as to the advisability of the course as a piece of wise financing.

The resolutions adopted by the directors of the Choctaw company today recite that there have been appropriated and expended for extension and improvement of the road for new equipment during the current year upwards of \$1,000,000, which expenditures have been paid out of the surplus net earnings. There was declared a stock dividend at the rate of one share for each ten held by the common stockholders, the stock dividend amounting to 15,000 shares of common stock, at the par value of \$50.00 per share, or \$750,000.
