OLD YALE STARS DEFEAT THE KIDS.

Veterans of the Gridiron Got Into Form and Win a Warm Contest.

New Haven, Conn., Oct. 22.—Football of an extraordinary character was witnessed by the bi-centennial guests at Yale field this afternoon, when a team composed of the most famous stars among Yale's former players lined up against the substitute university eleven.

The game was played immediately after the regularly scheduled game between the Yale varsity and Bates, and all of the 12,000 spectators remained to witness the old football against the new.

At the first line-up for the kick-off, there was a bewildering array of stars. Every former Yale player of prominence who had returned for the festival was in football togs, and all were lined up in a sort of mass parade for the first scrimmage.

Walter Camp, the dean of Yale football, was captain. Lined up with him were "Pa" Corbin, F. Gordon Brown, Hoffberger, Burr Chamberlain, former captain and tackle, and Fred Murphy, also an old captain.

From the moment of the first scrimmage it became evident that the same surprising skill remained in the great players who had often brought victory to Yale. Although they were worn puffing, they were still in every way with the fire and dash which amazed the spectators.
