BUSINESS. Local discount rates were steady between 5 and 6 per cent. Domestic exchange was quoted as follows: New York 50 discount bid, 50 discount asked; Chicago 25 discount bid, 25 discount asked; Cincinnati, Louisville and New Orleans, 25 discount bid, 25 discount asked.

London, Nov. 5.—Sir Frederick and Lady Milner do not like the idea of renting their town house for the purpose of introducing into society wealthy young American girls. Lady F. Milner, tall and dignified, entered the witness box in the court of Mr. Justice Wills yesterday and gave evidence in the suit which her husband, Sir Frederick Milner, brought against the well-known firm of auctioneers, Messrs. Lumley, Newton and Dowell. Sir Frederick, desiring to let his town house, No. 11 Hereford Gardens, Park Lane, put the matter into the hands of Lumley & Newton. A tenant was found, but proved to be "extremely undesirable."

DEATH FOLLOWED MARRIAGE. New Orleans Girl, Maid, Wife and Widow in an Hour. NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 5.—Helen F. Stehls, now Mrs. Helen Stehls Hardy, has been a maid, wife and widow within an hour. Stehls had Miss Stehls, who was called upon to discard them for the widow's weeds. The bridegroom was Wilfred G. Hardy, who was to be business man and acting teller of the Louisiana National Bank. The bride of yesterday was of a prominent family and her father, a wealthy banker in New Orleans. She and Mr. Hardy had been engaged for several years. Hardy was a young man of very strong constitution, and some months ago consumption developed with a rapidity which compelled him to leave his post in the bank and seek health across the lake, at Covington, La. The change benefited him, but even the pure air of the pine woods could not check the disease, and word was sent to Miss Stehls that there was no hope for his recovery. It was determined that the marriage, which had been planned, should be carried out. Yesterday the ceremony was performed in Mr. Hardy's sick chamber, in his home, in the presence of his father. Only the immediate relatives of the contracting parties were present. Immediately after the words were spoken making the couple man and wife, Mr. Hardy grew very weak. In something over fifty minutes after the conclusion of the ceremony he was dead.
