HOW TERMINAL RAILWAY HANDLES A CITY'S REFUSE.

Activity at the Company's Dump at Thirteenth and Poplar Streets an Indication of Boom in City Building—About 2,000 Loads of Clay and Dirt Received Daily.

One indication of building activity in St. Louis is noticeable at the Terminal Railroad Association dump at Thirteenth and Poplar streets, where every day a long line of wagons loaded with clay wait at the gates to be unloaded.

Trucks and the wagons stop directly over the empty cars. The opening of a trap door underneath the loaded vehicles permits the dirt to fall directly into the cars, and very little time and labor is used in the process of loading and unloading.

BRAVE WALDRUPE DIES OF WOUNDS.

His Heroic Efforts to Prevent Escape of Leavenworth Convicts Cost Him His Life.

Leavenworth, Kas., Nov. 15.—J. B. Waldrupe, a guard at the Fort Leavenworth military prison, who was shot during the mutiny at that institution on November 7, died today of his wounds.

Waldrupe was born in Greenback, Tenn. in 1868. He served in Cuba during the Spanish War in the United States Volunteer Signal Corps, later becoming a guard at the prison.

DISPUTES TAX ON SUGAR FROM ILOILO.

Protestants Insist That the Philip pines Are a Part of the United States.

New York, Nov. 15.—Suit has been commenced in the United States Circuit Court by Warner, Barnes & Co., of London, England, against Collector Edgewood to recover \$138,500, which it is claimed was paid under protest on a cargo of sugar brought by them from Iloilo, in the Philippines.

Warner, Barnes & Co. advance the claim that the island of Panay is American and not foreign territory, and that the collection of duty was contrary to the Constitution of the United States.


