HATS FOR JANUARY CHANGE THE APPEARANCE OF GOWNS.

New Head Dress Relieves Monotony of the Dull Color Schemes Which at This Time Seem to Prevail—Midwinter Suits and Wraps Give the Wearer the Appearance of Being Freshly Gowned.

The midwinter of our fashionable discontent is made glorious by the hats of January. These are directly at the heart of the matter and relieve the monotony of the dull schemes of dress, which at this time prevail.

It is against all rhyme or reason—against all chance belief—yet it is true, that the appearance of a gown can be altered by a change in hats. The woman who would look like new women can accomplish the result by replacing the winter-worn millinery with something fresh.

With an extravagantly long and very large bow, whether of muslin or feathers, of fur or of silk, and with a new hat topping and finishing the bon, a woman can look as though freshly gowned.

Take your gown of tobacco brown, a little passe, and make for yourself a wonderful box of black taffeta, bound upon the edges with scarlet pannel. Let it be in the form of a double rucking and let its ends depend to the very ground.

Now get for yourself a new hat. Let it be in black, or of some other color, but if covered with black velvet, perhaps you prefer to have it in brown, in which case use brown cloth, though black is very good.

At the front let there be a very long, very narrow buckle of silver with Roman finish. The buckle is like the oxidized metal, but is not quite so dark; it is more like unto a dull frost color. Let this buckle be caught through a mass of scarlet velvet to match the binding of your bon, and from the middle of the buckle let long feathers start and curl backward over the top of the hat, hanging down at the back, in sweeping fashion. 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SITE IS PURCHASED FOR SYRAN CHURCH.

St. Louis Is the Third American City to Have Such a Building.

LOCATED ON SOUTH BROADWAY.

Father Neomi, After Three Months' Efforts, Secures Choice Piece of Property and Congregation Will Build.

The Maronite congregation, of which the Reverend Mateo Neomi is pastor, has purchased property at Nos. 615 and 617 South Broadway, to be used as a church, making St. Louis the third city in the United States in which the Syrians, who comprise the Maronite branch of the Catholic Church, own their own church property.

The South Broadway property was purchased last Thursday, the eve of the feast of St. Anthony the Hermit, after whom the church is named. The congregation will take charge of the property as soon as the tenant who occupies the building moves.

Father Neomi has been in St. Louis only three months. As soon as he took charge of the congregation he announced his intention of securing a site for a church. He consulted with Archbishop Kahn, who granted his approval. Father Neomi then set about collecting funds. A society was formed for the purpose of facilitating the movement, and Festus J. Wade consented to act as treasurer. Joseph Bassel is secretary.

Father Neomi was successful beyond his expectations. William J. Tracey, from whom the property was purchased, donated \$25 to the church. Father Neomi wired an account of the purchase to the Right Reverend Archbishop of St. Louis, who is at Mount Lebanon, Syria, the head of the Maronite Church in Syria, subject to the jurisdiction of the Pope. The Reverend Archbishop's approval was secured. The Order of St. Anthony, of which Father Neomi belongs, was also notified.

WHIRLED TO DEATH BY MACHINERY. PRESIDENT TO VISIT CHARLESTON FEB. 11.

Painter Fell From Scaffold and Was Caught in Belling at Excelsior Brewery.

Clarence Reiley, a painter, who lived at No. 38 South Broadway, was whirled to his death in the shafting of the Excelsior Brewery at Seventeenth and Market streets, yesterday afternoon. One of his legs was almost torn off and his body was badly mangled.

Reiley was painting the ceiling of the engine-room, perched on a high scaffold, about 4 o'clock when the scaffold toppled and he fell on a large belt which was connected with a great wheel that was revolving at high speed. Reiley was crushed to death. His clothing was badly torn and his flesh bruised. The engineer took the body out and called the police. The body was taken to the morgue, where it will be held for the coroner's inquest to-day.
