Yet reflect a moment and there is no second-rate novel by Dickens which does not contain, I will not say one, but half a dozen, humorous character types, any of which might be named as a type of the present-day novel.

In addition to the rewarding essay from which the above quotation is made, Doctor Burton considers other topics relating to his general theme. Among these are the cult of the historical romance, the love motif in modern fiction, the dark in literature, the use of the Spanish-American war, a note on modern criticism and other phases which receive his discriminating attention. His little book of essays cannot fail to be appreciated by the thoughtful reader.

Messrs. D. Appleton & Co., New York, announce the publication of his spring of "Bird Life" by Frank M. Chapman, associate curator of the American Museum of Natural History, "Insect Life," by John Henry Comstock, professor of entomology in Cornell University, and "The Garden and the Leaves," by F. Schuyler Mathews, "Familiar Flowers of Field and Garden," by Schuyler Mathews.

Wallace Irwin, the author of the literary sensation, "Love Sonnets of a Hoodlum," has been told that slang is vulgar, and after due reflection has come to the conclusion that his informant is right. The result is that he has underwritten a new novel, and his second book is nothing if not elegant in its diction. However, the depiction in slang has not marred the originality and humor of the "Hobnobber of Ghazal," which is published by Elder & Shepard, San Francisco, and bids fair to outrank even the "Love Sonnets" in popularity and lasting merit.

The J. B. Lippincott Company, Philadelphia, issue this week a new novel by John Burroughs, "The March of the Wheel." It is a cleverly told story of English life, with a certain element of mysticism in its plot, and the interest is well maintained to the end. The characters are drawn with a light and easy touch, and the story's happy ending leaves a pleasant impression in the reader's mind.

"Ocean to Ocean" is the title of a book fresh from the press of A. C. McClurg & Co., Chicago, and written by Admiral J. W. G. Walker, U. S. N., chief of the United States Naval Commission appointed by the United States Government to report on the most available route for an interoceanic canal to be carried into literature, for the publication of the title of "The Thrill of Life" by the author in 1898 while in the employ of the Nicaragua Canal Commission, and aims to give a correct idea of the country and people under treatment. It is illustrated from original photographs and supplied with maps and contains much valuable information.

A volume of short stories under the title of "Love in His Soudness" comes from the publishing house of D. Appleton & Co., New York, the author being J. R. Aitken. The stories are of Scottish rural life and are delicately told. They are eighteen in number and are subdivided as stories of a minister, of wounded hearts, of an artist, of a literary man and of a domineer.

Messrs. A. C. McClurg & Co., have added two new titles to their successful "Southern Sketches" series.
