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"BOUQUET JOHNNIE" AGAIN IN THE TOILS. Notorious Confidence Man With International Reputation in Custody in Tacoma, Wash.

John C. Beauclough, alias "Bouquet Johnnie," and the possessor of half a dozen more aliases, one of the most successful confidence men in the country, is under arrest in Tacoma, Wash. This information was conveyed to Circuit Clerk F. J. Hollocher of Clayton yesterday in a letter from Walter M. Harvey, Deputy Prosecuting Attorney in Tacoma.

Harvey wrote to Mr. Hollocher asking for a certificate of Beauclough's conviction at the December term of the Clayton Circuit Court in 1888. He said he had been advised through the Northern Pacific Railway Company and the Pinkerton National Detective Agency that Beauclough had been convicted in Clayton for swindling S. C. Parrett of Kansas City out of \$50 on a Missouri Pacific train in 1888.

Beauclough is well remembered in Clayton. He was arrested with his brother, "Bill," Beauclough, and the latter succeeded in escaping punishment. John Beauclough was convicted and sentenced to two years, but got him a new trial. When the motion for the new trial was being argued, Beauclough arose in the courtroom and rebuked the judge.

Beauclough is now about 60 years old. It is supposed that the Tacoma officials are anxious to convict him under the latter law, as evidence of convictions in other States could be used only for that purpose.

The Trust Company of the Republic, of New York, announces that it is authorized to receive applications for \$300,000 of the first mortgage 4 per cent sinking fund bonds of the Republic of Cuba Shipbuilding Company at 75c. Subscriptions in bonds will be closed on June 15, and remain open until June 19. The bonds are part of an authorized issue of \$1,000,000 of which \$500,000 are withdrawn from public issue to provide cash working capital for the company and \$500,000 are reserved in the treasury. The bonds are a first mortgage upon the following plants acquired by the company, namely: The Union Iron Works of San Francisco, Cal.; The Bath Iron Works of Bath, Me.; The Crescent Shipyard and the Samuel I. Moore & Sons Co., Elizabethport, N. J.; the Eastern Shipbuilding Company, New London, Ct.; the Harlan & Hollingsworth Company, Wilmington, Del.; and the Canada Manufacturing Company, Carteret, N. J. The fixed charges on the total issue are \$200,000, making the sinking fund requirement \$1,000,000, and leaving a balance of \$500,000. Dividends at the rate of 6 per cent on the preferred stock call for \$60,000, leaving \$440,000 for dividends on the common shares. The president of the Trust Company of the Republic, and John J.
