


LAW ENFORCEMENT LEAGUE READY TO BEGIN FIGHT ON WINEROMS.





New Office Building for President Roosevelt Will Be a Brick Colonial Structure of Seven Rooms—It Will Be Only One Story High.



Washington, June 21.—The "Little White House," as the new building for the President's business quarters will probably be known, is to be in effect a part of the Executive Mansion proper. One-half of the present large conservatory attached to the west wing will be torn down. The rest of the structure will be a substantial brick building, two stories high, with a depth of 30 feet, and will be built in a style to harmonize with the older building.
