MARKETING BUILDING SELLS FOR \$375,000. CONTRACT DEAL OFFICE OF COMMITTEE.

Germania Trust Buys Structure at Sixth and Olive From the Reliance Realty Company.

Exposition Representatives Will Confer With President Ramsey on Park View Co.'s Offer.

PAYS GROSS RENT OF \$75,000. CHANGES EXPECTED TO RESULT

Building Erected Three Years Ago on Ground Leased for Ninety-Nine Years at Sixteen Thousand Dollars a Year.

The Carleton building, at the northeast corner of Sixth and Olive streets, was sold yesterday by the Germania Trust Company for \$375,000.

William H. Thompson, Nathan Frank and L. D. Dozier to Act With President Francis in the Matter.

President Francis has announced the committee to consider the proposal made by President Ramsey of the Washburn Realty company for the lease of the Carleton tract, as being made up of William H. Thompson, Nathan Frank and L. D. Dozier. The President will act with the committee.

Consideration of the proposition will occupy the committee shortly, and its answer will be sent to Mr. Ramsey, who left the city yesterday to be absent for two weeks. This policy is in accordance with the refusal of the Exposition management to negotiate with the Park View Realty Company.

The opinion of the officers and directors of the Exposition Company that conditions have changed materially since the breaking off of former negotiations indicate that the proposal made by Mr. Ramsey on behalf of the Park View Realty Company will have to be modified if the tract is rented for Exposition purposes.

Where \$200 was discussed as a possible price for the grounds the Exposition Company had not acquired the Tesson tract, a transaction that has involved the expenditure of a large sum of money more than \$50,000. The directors say that when the company was negotiating with the Park View Realty Company, they had in mind a tract that only a small portion of the Tesson tract would be leased.


