

# JUDGE SIDENER RAISES PRICE OF PRISONER'S DRINKS.

Defendant Admits Taking Twelve Portionals and is Assessed \$15 as a Result.

It cost Otto Hugelmann \$15, or \$1.25 for each drink necessary to cause the state of intoxication in which he appeared as a defendant before Judge Sidener yesterday morning.

Mrs. Henrietta Spuler of No. 144 South Third street, sister-in-law of Hugelmann, with whom he lived, charged him with disturbing her peace. Hugelmann attempted to act as his own attorney in the case and when questioning Mrs. Spuler showed that he was intoxicated.

"How many drinks have you had this morning," he was asked by Judge Sidener. "About twelve, your Honor," replied Hugelmann.

"Well, those twelve will cost you \$15, which, with costs amounting to \$1, will make \$16 in all. You should have drunk champagne, young man. It would not have made you so drunk, and I believe would have saved your health."

Hugelmann paid his fine, remarking, as he quit, that he was a "conscientious 'jag' he had accumulated in years."

Judge Sidener demonstrated his disapproval by staying the fine and letting Ring off with the costs.

After hearing the testimony on each side Judge Sidener assessed a fine of \$20 against the defendant.

As the Judge announced his decision the defendant's attorney, Mr. MacIntyre, demanded her fees as a witness. Mr. MacIntyre informed Judge Sidener of the application, and the Judge said: "If the witnesses are going to demand their fees for testifying against a man who has been heavily fined for such an offense, I shall stay the fine against him and let him go on his own hook."

## Prisoner is Given a Chance.

Fredrick Schults, a defendant in the First District Police Court, yesterday morning created considerable excitement in that tribunal when he fled from the courtroom to the courtroom he broke away from the Deputy Marshal, and for a few minutes the principal played a game of tag with the principal.

Schults made no attempt to get away, but kept running around the chairs and tables. Two other deputies and Clerk MacIntyre joined in the chase and succeeded in placing Schults in the defendant's chair.
