FUNERAL OF EDWARD R. SCHMIDT.

Victim of Football Accident is Buried at Stanton, Ill.

Impressive scenes marked the funeral at Stanton, Ill., yesterday afternoon of Edward R. Schmidt, the young man who died Sunday from injuries received in a football game between the Stanton team and the College of St. Louis. The church from which the services were conducted was crowded to the doors, and fully a thousand persons either marched or rode in the procession to the cemetery. Former members of the Stanton team, which disbanded immediately after news of Schmidt's death, acted as a bodyguard during the procession from the home to the church and cemetery. Not far from any funeral in Stanton has been so widely attended, and the majority of those present were personally acquainted with the dead man. The coffin was almost hidden by flowers worked into many different designs. Three bands led the procession and different organizations of which Schmidt was a member assisted in the services. The Knights of Pythias conducted the ceremonies at the Schmidt home. At the body was removed to St. Paul's Evangelical Church, where the services were in charge of the Reverend G. W. Knicker. The Stanton band, of which Schmidt was a member, the Mount Olive and the People bands headed the procession to the cemetery. On each side of the hearse ten former members of the football team marched slowly and with tears in their eyes.
