H. A. Wolff, President of St. Louis Drug Clerks' Association, Tells His Afflicted Friends How They Can Be Quickly Cured.

Wolff, president of the St. Louis Drug Clerks' Association, and Chief Chemist at Robeson's Drug Store, Broadway and Lucas avenue, which is undoubtedly the best-known of the kind in this locality, when talking to a Republic reporter. The subject of constipation sufferers and the little relief they secure from the various treatments was under discussion.

Heavy selling by commission-houses, partly for elevator account, was the feature of the local corn market yesterday. Despite the efforts of the shorts to depress the market, the decline was not much greater than usual in an active Saturday market.

Thomas A. Cleary, the leader of the bull movement, did not make any special effort to advance the market, but he increased his holdings on every recession. The selling for elevators was against purchases of cash grain at arrival.

Chicago, Nov. 22.—There was a fair trade in wheat to-day, and the market was strong, Dec. clearing 1 1/2c higher, with May up 3/4c. Dec. corn closed 1/2c lower, with oats 1/4c higher. Jan. provisions closed 7/8c to 1c higher.


