BOARD REFUSES TO REOPEN SCHOOL PLUMBING QUESTION.

Special Committee of the B. P. I. Will Investigate the Practice of Tearing Up Streets Without Permit.

The Board of Public Improvements received a communication from the Board of Education yesterday asking for another hearing in the matter of plumbing which has been done in some of the public schools.

A special committee, consisting of Assistant Commissioner Strong, Water Commissioner Ben Atkins, Sewer Commissioner Valliant and A. J. O'Reilly, Superintendent of Streets, will take up the question of gas, electric and transit companies tearing up streets without a permit and restoring them to their original condition.

The committee has rendered its opinion in Mayor Wells upon the subject, and the committee bases its action on Mr. Bates' report.
