

HORSES AT DELMAR ALL OF ONE CLASS.

No Appreciable Difference Between the Reputed Best and Worst Among Them.

CASES THAT ARE IN POINT.

Back Young No Better Than Judge Cantrell—Lady Strathmore Might Not Beat Wild Katie—No Form.

Two odds-on favorites were soundly beaten at Delmar Park races on Saturday. The defeat of Pourpoint was a 1-20 shot in the Glencade Stakes—she was not even third—was a surprise in most quarters. Not so to the Republic, which forecasted her probable defeat.

The sole and simple reason of this defeat is that the filly, like all horses racing locally, is in but the one class. There is not at St. Louis nor a horse-breed medicine ability.

Certain horses, however, are regarded as possessing higher class. On this they are regarded as certain winners, and are made 3-20 favorites, standing an excellent chance of being beaten.

Jack Young, for instance, is supposed to possess class. Mr. Baker refused \$5000 last winter, so his said, though there is a shrewd suspicion that it is Gohemissim, not Young, that Charlie Huchee was really after. Very well, Pourpoint has run like Young, the \$5000 colt, to a neck on Thursday. On Saturday, Judge Cantrell, a \$500 colt, who has been and will be beaten by \$400 platers, easily beat Pourpoint by weights relatively the same.

The bettor will now regard Cantrell as a stake horse, and will back him to beat Pourpoint and Jack Young. As a matter of fact, Pathee, The Wizard and horses of that kind can beat him and Young also.

The fact is that Young, Pourpoint, Judge Cantrell and Pathee are all in the same class—\$400 platers.

THE CLASS OF MAUD GONNE.

Take another case of class—Maud Gonne. She is reported great and of high class because she beat the wretched Myshner and Ed Ball. Eda Riley, a mare who has a colt old enough to be a sire, and who has one foot hanging to her leg by a thread, beat Myshner quite as decisively as Maud Gonne did.

Again, when Maud Gonne met Miss Mae Day, the latter giving her two pounds, the bettors figured Gonne a 3-20 shot. In a fair trial Miss Day beat her, seven furlongs, in 1:25 1/2. Mae Day is a \$500 plater. She has been run for that winning at odds of 10 to 1 all over the Coast.

Her owner offered her for sale for very little more, but his highest bidder was a man who wanted to race her at the county fair and who offered \$250 for her. W. W. Warren refused to give \$150 for her. Mr. Elliott, her owner, said that she was affected by the heat of the day, and that she was not in her best condition.

Kenova was badly beaten by Golden Gutter, who cannot beat Baronet. Then Kenova ran away from Jack Young and Judge Cantrell, almost the same way weighted. Landola should have beaten Kenova when Golden Gutter did, and Landola cannot beat any of the other winners.

Her races were alike.

The stake lot, however, was just like the \$100 lot—no difference. That is about the case with each other back and forth. The luck of the race, not the merit of the horse, produces the winner. He has his lucky day and wins. Then the luck breaks the other way and the other wins.
