

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VETERAN PILOT DIES IN GRIEF.

to Anthony Conners. Captain Dodds's portion of the estate was small, only a few hundred dollars, and the home was lost. He came home late Wednesday night and sat down on a bench in the yard. His housekeeper heard him and about 2 o'clock in the morning went out and urged him to retire.

Captain Dodds was born in Middleton, Pa., and celebrated his seventy-first birthday in St. Louis a week ago today. He came to St. Louis in 1855 with his brother, William, who survives him.

His funeral will take place from Landvoet's undertaking establishment, No. 870 North Ninth street, to-morrow afternoon.
